They will be in Hillsboro and neighborhood three months or more.

The West Side & Suburban Railroad running from Portland, westward through Cedar Mill, Hillsboro to Forest Grove has not abandoned the project though it is tied up till a right of way out of Portland has been obtained. If Portland will not let the road out of the city the company will seek elsewhere for investment.

The company will pay special attention to timber and government lands of which they now have a large amount on hand. One of the company is our townsman Mr. Edey a professional timber cruiser and government locator while J. J. Walter of Portland, another member of the firm will look after local affairs and incidentally lecture in eastern states on the resources of Oregon and induce people to turn their attention toward the Pacific northwest. All that farmers east want is information on the resources and possibilities of Oregon to turn a tide of sturdy immigrants in this direction.

The proposition before the city this week made by gentlemen desirous of installing a condensed milk factory here is one that we should not let pass. The men have one factory but want another since the first can not fill orders. They propose to install a plant here costing \$50,000. They want no subsidy but must have a guarantee that 20,000 pounds of milk per day will be furnished them. For this milk the company will pay at least 10 cents per 100 pounds more than the market price when made into butter. To produce that quantity of milk will require 1,000 cows or more. The work asked of Hillsboro is to appoint a canvassing committee to see if our farmers will put that many cows on farms within a radius of five miles. All farmers will have to do is to own their delivery cans and deliver milk to the factory every day. The factory will even wash the cans. Twelve farmers with 100 cows each will make up the number, or 24 with 50 cows each will do it. And so the matter is distributed. To Hillsboro it means a pay roll of \$1,000 per month. To the dairymen it means prosperity and a fertilization of farms. To help the factory men a mass meeting of the citizens of Hillsboro was held in the city hall last Tuesday evening. Mayor Bailey presided. The attendance was large. Only one thing seemed necessary at this time to do, and that is to appoint a canvassing committee to go among the farmers and find out how much milk can be delivered to the factory five months hence when it is ready to work. If 20,000 pounds per day can be delivered the factory will be built. If that much cannot be obtained the project will be abandoned. A committee of eight was voted, and appointed by the chair, to-wit: Ed. Schulmerich, J. P. Tamselle, W. H. Wehring, Jno. Northrup, S. S. Barnes, F. M. Heide, J. A. Imbrie and Jas. H. Sewell. The committee met after the mass meeting adjourned and laid out its work. First the members will inform themselves so as to be able to answer all enquiries that may be made, and then will find out how much milk can reasonably be looked for when the factory, if installed, is ready to run. There will be some expense incurred and the committee will have to call on the citizens of Hillsboro for help. At the meeting it was clearly brought out that a factory must at once be commenced. If Hillsboro cannot furnish the milk, then another locality will. We are first visited and if an affirmative response is made, the answer must be ready within ten or twelve days.

A farmer criticised Hillsboro this week, thought the town was grasping. He thought the town ought to do something but just what was wrapped up in "The town ought to buy as well as sell." Is it true that the town will not buy of farmers? Last year 16 car loads of potatoes went from the Hillsboro station bought and shipped by a Hillsboro dealer. All the onions that local dealers could get from traveling agents were taken. A car of cabbage went forward the week before last and more is to go. Hillsboro people buy wheat and oats, hope when the grower does not deal with the exporter. Beef and pork are bought here. Can it be that the farmer that complained never brings anything to town to sell? Just now Hillsboro is trying to promote a manufactory that will take all the milk farmers will bring. Hillsboro will buy that if the farmers will bring enough. In this matter the farmers must do. Hillsboro can't go into their fields and pastures and care for cattle.

A visitor who is at Wallace, Idaho this week writes this paragraph of the town. "This place is quite a town. It has a school house that cost \$34,000 and an opera house of \$17,000 valuation. Some of the stores are worthy of Spokane or Portland and one firm carries constantly a stock of \$250,000 worth of merchandise. Streets show that a great outlay of money has been made to fix up the town. It has a population of about 3000, between 35 and 40 saloons and an average church attendance on Sunday mornings in Protestant places of worship (combined) of 50 and in the evenings 190! The shrine here at which the devoted worshippers bow in intense adoration service is the Almighty Dollar.

Mrs. Thomas Johnston living near Bethany fell this week and broke a bone of the forearm near the wrist. She had stepped out of her home on a covering spanning a culvert and was in the act of handing mail to the carrier who was passing. The boards were slippery and were not a safe support as the fall evidenced. Dr. Tamselle reduced the fracture.
