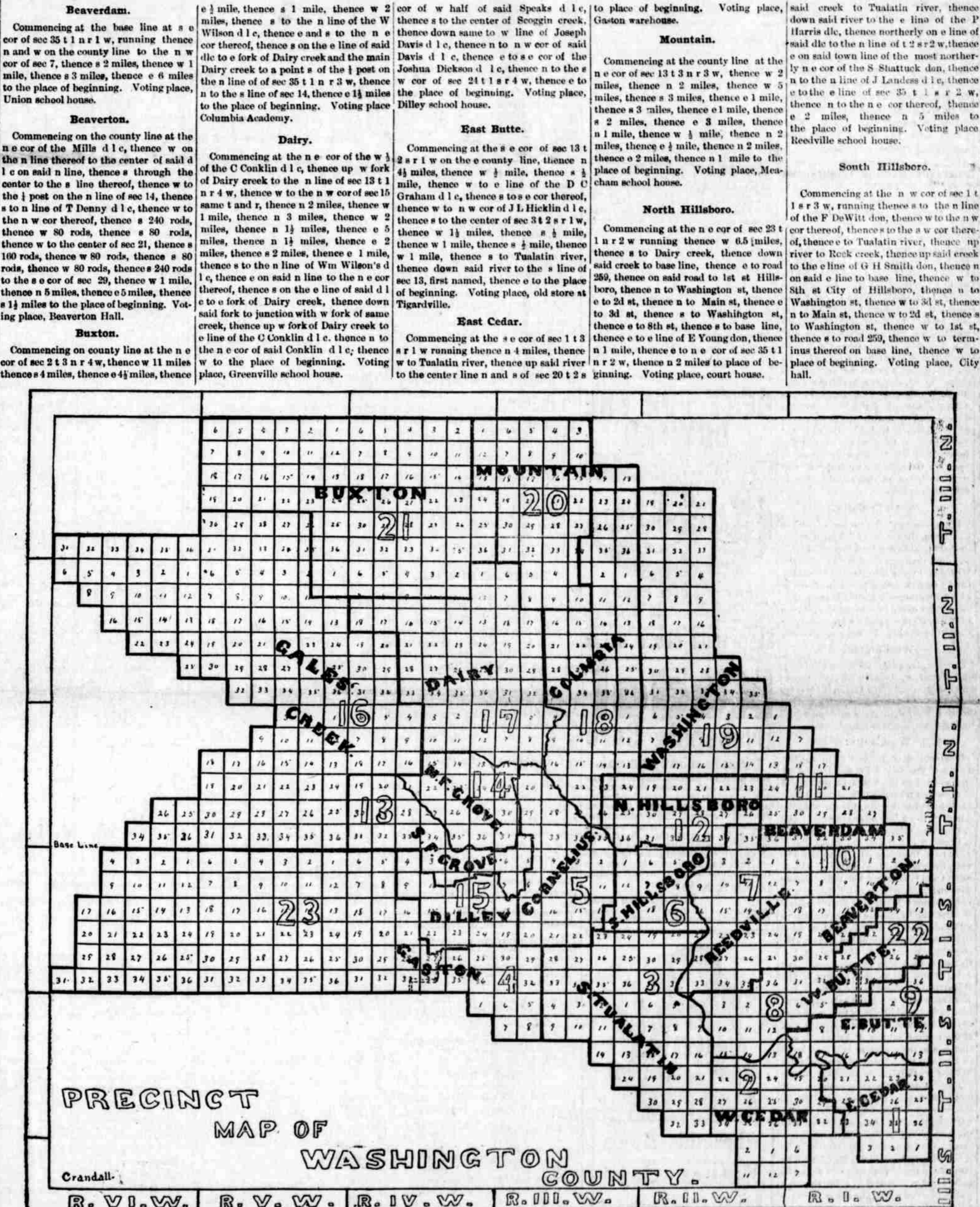

## NEWS OF THE STATE.

Dredging the ship channel of the Columbia is in active progress. More than a 25-foot channel is sought.

Residents of Montavilla, a suburb east of Portland, are agitating the installing of a fruit cannery for their cluster of houses. It is desired that a plant costing \$10,000 be built. If a subsidy of \$20,000 can be secured the large concern can be had.

An exchange reports that the weather for the past fortnight has been unfavorable for those office-seekers who have had their ears to the ground hoping to get a reverberation of the rumbling that occurs about the first Monday in June.

With pomp and ceremony the mid-year commencement was held at the State Normal School, at Monmouth, this week. The opening number was the sermon last Sunday preached by Pres. Lee, of Albany college. Subject, "I am Debtor."

The engineers having the jetty work at the mouth of the Columbia in hand are opening a rock quarry at Bugby's Hole, on the Lower River, which promises to be what has so long been sought. It saves 100 or more miles of transportation.

It is now given out that the oil tank, which the S. P. Co. will construct in Ashland, is to be of mammoth proportions. It will be 38 feet high from the ground with a diameter of 113 feet, and will have a capacity of holding 55,000 barrels of oil. There are 42 gallons in a barrel, so that a little multiplication shows that the new tank when full will contain 2,310,000 gallons.—Ashland Tidings.

A reporter for the Oregonian has run up against a sheriff from Washington who has a lot of advice "How to run a newspaper," but will not say why he holds a prisoner. Occasionally such officers are found. Jacob Rheis, of the New York Tribune, found some of them in his day. Rheis came out ahead, and so will Jerry in this instance, conditioned only that he counts the game worth the candle.

The electric light system was completed Tuesday and the "juice" turned on about noon to test the circuit. Most of the lights appeared all right, and those that did not were adjusted and a full circuit turned on that evening, and for the first time North Yamhill was lighted with electricity. There is perhaps a larger proportion of lighted residences in this town than in any other town in the state.—North Yamhill Record.

A messenger arrived in Baker City Monday, January 27, bringing with him a bottle of the first oil struck in Malheur Basin. The oil came from the Newell well, a short distance from the town of Nampa, and was obtained at a depth of 110 feet. The oil analyzes 78 per cent paraffine, the highest grade of natural oil known. Much excitement prevails. Two miles from the Newell well oil has been reached at a depth of 450 feet. This well can now pump twenty-five barrels per day.

A German market report just received at Portland states that 600 boxes of apples from the orchard of Weeks Orr, of Medford, Jackson county, this state, and another lot packed by T. R. Whitman, of Medford district, had been rejected and not allowed in the German market because the fruit is infected with San Jose scale. The shipments were turned off to English dealers, where there are no inspection regulations. The incident is unfortunate, since to send out infected fruit is like killing the goose that lays the golden egg.

A large business deal was consummated Friday in Roseburg, the parties interested being the Roseburg Water Co. and G. W. Bashford & Son, of the New Era flouring mills. The water company has heretofore owned and utilized one-half the power from the dam in the South-Union river, and for some time they have wished to secure the other half controlled by Bashford & Son, but a suitable figure could not be agreed upon. However, an understanding was reached last week whereby the water company purchased the desired property for \$7,000. It is understood that Bashford & Son will move their mill nearer to the heart of the city, on a site yet to be decided upon, and it is probable that they will make repairs and other improvements on the structure in the nature of an addition to be built of brick. The power in the new location will be supplied by electricity from the new plant recently put in by the Douglas Electric Co. at the present site.—Roseburg Review.
