A NOTABLE ENGINEERING PROJECT

One of the largest reservoir sites in the West is under the examination of the United States Geological Survey. The dam site is situated in a narrow gorge, just below the juncture of Salt River and Tonto Creek, Arizona. The capacity of the proposed reservoir with a dam 200 feet meaced. in elevation above the bed of the river, is nearly 1,000,000 acre feet, or more than that of the great reservoir now in construction on the Nile, or than any other artificial reservoir in the world.

One of the serious obstacles met in planning for the construction of this more. It is killing all the prairie great reservoir was the difficulty in chickens, bob white qualls and many securing hydraulic cement at a cost of the song birds, low enough to make the project financially practical. About 150,000 which, owing to the isolated location haul, would reach the almost prohibitive rate of \$9 per barret. Fortunately materials were found at hand suitable for manufacturing a high grade cement, which will save nearly a million dollars in construction.
