WHERE WE STAND

Platform Adopted by Republicans of Oregon

WE WILL KEEP THE PHILIPPINES
The President Endorsed in His Stand
Against Capital

The republican party of Oregon, in state convention assembled, proud of its record and past history, its devotion to the principles of human liberty and human rights, its great and imperishable names which lend luster and glory to the nation of the earth, and as an assurance of its continued fidelity to the great principles for which it has contended in the past in state and national affairs, does hereby make and affirm the following declaration of its principles.

The events of the late war with Spain carried us into the Philippine Islands. We hold it to be consistent with the principles of liberty and of our National life that the sovereignty of the United States should be maintained in the islands, under such local self-government as the people may be, or may become, fitted to participate in. We therefore declare against all proposals looking to the retirement of the United States from the Philippine Islands.

That in the war which President Roosevelt has inaugurated against the gigantic combinations of incorporated capital he has the unified and enthusiastic support of the Republican party of Oregon.

We demand and insist upon the passage of the bill now pending in Congress for the exclusion of Chinese, known as the Mitchell-Kahn exclusion bill.

We reaffirm our allegiance to the principles of protection in necessary cases of industries still in their infancy or unable to compete with foreign productions.

We recognize the right of labor to organize and combine for mutual protection under the law, and we recommend that the legislature enact all necessary legislation to protect labor in all its rights and privileges. In the interests of American labor and the upbuilding of the workingman as the corner-stone of the prosperity of our country, we recommend that Congress create a Department of Labor in charge of a Secretary, with a seat in the Cabinet.

We demand that a law be passed by the next Legislature placing all public officers of this state upon reasonable salaries, which shall not be increased during the incumbent's term of office, and beyond such salary they shall receive no compensation as fees or otherwise.

In order to promote the development of the mineral resources of the state, we are in favor of the creation of, and the maintenance of a mining bureau by the state.

We declare our approval and support of the suggestions of President Roosevelt for the irrigation of the arid lands of the country. This work should be undertaken by the United States as soon as possible, and carried forward on a consistent plan, under direction of the General Government.

We urge our Representatives in Congress and Senators to use every effort to secure the speedy opening of the Columbia River between The Dalles and Celilo, and for clearing the river of all obstructions to navigation from its mouth to head of navigation. We urge also renewed and continued effort for improvement of our Coast harbors and streams within the state, and the speedy construction of an isthmian canal.

That the public lands are the heritage of the common people and should be held in trust for the use and benefit of all the people under the homestead laws. We are therefore unalterably opposed to all plans, schemes or propositions for leasing public domains, either to individuals or corporations.

We favor a policy by the state and the United States which shall further foster and support our fisheries, and we request the Legislature to enact such further measures as may be found by experience necessary to obtain this result.

We demand and insist upon the immediate passage by Congress of the United States of the oleomargarine bill, known as the new Grant bill, now pending in the Senate.

That we favor the proposed amendment to the state constitution providing for the initiative and referendum, and recommend its adoption by the people of the state.

We declare our approval of the principles of the primary law enacted by the Legislature at the session of 1901, and we ask the Legislature to extend this law so that in its main features it may apply to primary elections in all election precincts throughout the state. And we further recommend the election of United States Senators by popular vote.

The Story of a
Soldier's Struggle

Ten Years' Trial

That was a sore blow to this Seattle. It left the situation on the south side in the hands of the rioters for over an hour. Word was sent to little Major McConville, but he, with his men, was moving and guarding cattle trains. The best he could do was to send a company on the run, but their captain had had no experience. The sheriff vainly tried to tell them how Langdon had handled things over at the Big Horn. He would take no responsibility. They dare not, and the mob saw it in a twinkling. The only wonder is they did not dash upon this isolated command and by sheer force of numbers bear it down and seize its arms. When at last the Nathan train started in and the command tumbled off at the suburbs, it was the younger officers who led the detachments, Nathan retaining 40 of his men ostensibly to guard the train. But it was his own precious hide of which he was thinking. He decided to establish his headquarters in his own car, while Torrance, with 30 sturdy latters met on one flank, and Woodrow, with a like number on the other, shored ahead and, guided by deputy sheriffs and railway officials, did their belated work in short order and yet in deep chagrin. Santley, sulen and disgusted, was retained with Nathan as adjutant, but he could only obey. The news of Melville's prostration reached them five miles out from town and completed Nathan's demoralization even while it threw him in supreme command. Things were indeed in grievous shape when the vice presidential car rolled into the Seattle yards and ranged up alongside that of Captain Nathan. By that time, thanks to Santley, sentinels had been thrown about the sacred precincts, and, seeing no rioters in the immediate neighborhood, Nathan had measurably recovered his nerve. He hoped to make a favorable impression on his wife's phrenetic uncle, but Mr. Barley sniffed the fumes of smoldering thousands, and the sight of half a mile of smoking ruins up the track soured him utterly. All this could have been prevented had Nathan shown any dash, pluck, energy—and so many possess. And then to think that even now the Big Horn was open! He had seen Channing's first train whistling down the opposite side of the gorge. He learned from his satellites, hearing the car to the east of town, of the almost miraculous rescue of the Big Horn's buildings. A tremendous story it made by that time, and the heart of the magnate was sore in his bosom that such ill should have befallen the Seattle, such good fortune the Missouri Valley. He hated Channing, anyhow. Channing was sprung from the ranks and had worked his way up step by step from section boss to superintendent in one road after another. He had been assistant general superintendent of the Seattle only a few years back, and when the vacancy occurred that should have been tendered to so energetic and valuable a man it was Barley who opposed it. "Channing's all right for an assistant or sub-ordinator," said he, "but he hasn't the education or the social position a superintendent should have." So a man with Barley's requirements got the promotion over Channing's head, whereas the latter instantly resigned, went over to the Northern Pacific, for a short term, and then it was the Big Horn that tendered him the superintendency and within another year made him general manager.

"If the president and board of directors will look after the finances," said he, "I'll run the road." And run it he had and marvelously well, to the dismay of the Seattle. And now at the first serious clash he had frightened things out for his own road while the strikers were smashing things for the Seattle, and Barley could have cured the day he let him go.

THESE ARE THEY.

Thurston Baxton.

Continuing the story of last week, attention is directed to Thurston Baxton, for County Judge. He is a native born Oregonian and a descendant of one of the oldest pioneer families in the state. Mr. Baxton is a strong man and handles his large interests most skillfully. He is public spirited and a great favorite in his home neighborhood. He is a fit man for the trust that is sought to give him.

E. J. Goodman.

Mr. Goodman, republican nominee for County Clerk, is a hoosier and was born in 1868. At the age of 13 he began studying telegraphy. He followed that occupation for a number of years. In 1881 he came west and was station agent and telegraph operator for the Atlantic & Pacific R. R. Co. in Arizona. In 1887 he was appointed to the office of County Recorder and Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Mohave county in that territory, a place equivalent to our clerk's office. He was elected to succeed himself twice. In the fall of 1893 he came to Oregon and settled on a farm near Tigardville which he owns, also an interest in the flouring mill at Tigardville. Mr. Goodman is an affable gentleman, a fine penman and an accurate and methodical business man. He is very popular at home and the large republican vote in his precinct is largely due to his personal exertion. Washington county has been fortunate from the beginning in having efficient county clerks, and the line will not be broken by selecting Mr. Goodman.

Emil L. Kurath.

Mr. Kurath, for Recorder of Conveyances, though of German parentage, was born in New York City in 1866. While yet a boy in knickerbockers the family moved to Philadelphia. There young Emil entered the American College, the public school. He learned to read and write. In 1875 as a lad of 11 years he came to Oregon with his father and mother who settled near Bethany, in this county. It was woods then, but with an ax and auger and frebrand a most delightful home has been built. Mr. Kurath has more than a common school education, for private tutors did what is beyond the attempts of the public school. He is a fine penman and an expert with papers. He has been deputy assessor for three terms and his papers are filed with the assessor in fine shape. Mr. Kurath wedded in 1885, and is a leader in his neighborhood, especially among the young people. In business he has been successful and he is an ideal man for the place to which his party calls him.

W. M. Jackson.

The republican candidate for treasurer is W. M. Jackson of Dilley. Born in Indiana, he with his family at the age of three years, went to Iowa, where he grew to manhood on a farm, barring only the time he served in the army, for at the age of 16 years he enlisted in the 33rd Iowa Infantry Volunteers. This regiment belonged with the army of the Cumberland for a time and then was attached to the army of the Gulf. Canby commanded those troops. He wedded Mary E. Smith who is yet the homemaker. Three children have come to them, two of whom are married. Mr. Jackson came to Oregon and Washington county in 1893. His land is at Dilley and is planted to fruit. He served as justice of the peace eight years in Kansas and two years here. He is now President of the Washington County Veterans Association also the Iowa veterans who are in Oregon. Mr. Jackson is a skilled accountant and of unblemished integrity. His fitness for the place he hopes to occupy is acknowledged, and his party believes that it will land him there.

Hill, of the Great Northern, Jim Hill, boasts that the aim of the merger trust will be reached one way or another. Perhaps. But Mr. Hill must remember that he is one, while the people are two or three. He will not succeed if he defies the people. If he can show that the merger will be in the interest of public policy at the same time that it benefits the corporation, the public will second Mr. Hill's efforts, but if it shall appear that his schemes are opposed to sound public policy, then they ought not to succeed.

No trust, in modern times at least, has been hit quite so hard as was the sugar trust in the passage of the Cuban reciprocity bill last Friday. A bill favored by the American Sugar Refinery people and opposed by sugar beet interests had been perfected granting the Cubans a 20 per cent reduction from the Dingley tariff. The Cuban's friends in America said it was not enough; must be 50 per cent reduction to give any relief whatever. The bill came up for final action on Friday, and the protectionist congressmen proceeded to give more than the 20 per cent by including the differential which is a straight 1 cent per pound or more, depending on the purity. The bill so amended passed. It carried consternation to the sugar refiners and may make cheaper sugar this spring for our gooseberries.

NEWS OF THE STATE.

A steamboat of 80 tons burden is to be launched on the lower Rogue River and ply between a quartz mine and the mouth of the river.

The laundry employees of Portland have quit work and planted pickets. We now will have to don black linen and wear it for two or more weeks without change.

Fifteen thousand young brook trout have been turned loose in Necanicum creek, the chief stream of Clatsop county that empties directly into the ocean at Seaside summer resort.

While feeding the lions of the circus in Portland last Monday the keeper was caught by the hungry beasts and all but devoured. He was badly torn and will be on the sick list for two months or more.

The sawmill men of Portland have quit work on a demand for higher wages which so far has not been granted. It is thought that the building industry will be touched and carpenters thrown out of work for lack of lumber.

At large expense, Portland constructed two big reservoirs in a gulch on the Canyon Road leading this way. The hill above commenced slipping and ruined the water basins. The slide has been anchored by tile draining the hill on the bed rock.

A lad 21 years of age went south on the California overland last week who measured 7 feet 10 inches in height and weighed 490 pounds. The boy was found among the woodchoppers of British Columbia, and is going into a Yankee dime show tent.

Cramer Bros, who last year bought the Corvallis carriage factory, added to the plant their Organ factory machinery, have installed a sawmill and now manufacture their own lumber, fir, hemlock, ash and oak. Logs for this are brought from the Coast Range by the Oregon and Eastern railroad.

Minchin, accused of plagiarism two years ago, in his oration, "Wendell Phillips, the Agitator," the delivery of which won him the medal that year for best intercollegiate orator, has again won out in a prohibition oratorical contest. He gets \$100 which is for expense money to an interstate contest in Lincoln, Nebraska, to be held in June.

The bank at Brownsville, Linn county, was robbed of \$1500 cash at the noon hour last Monday. When the cashier went to lunch he closed only the inner door of the vault. This was quite easily opened with a steel bar. Gloss, the cashier, discovered his loss at one o'clock, p. m. when he went to the vault. Two local characters have been arrested and others are watched.

The Portland Journal News Service reports that surveying engineers were put in the field last Monday to begin the survey of the Oregon & Pacific railroad from Grants Pass, Oregon, to Crescent City, California. Depot grounds and right of way have been secured in Grants Pass and through Josephine county. The California Northern is building to Crescent City and will be there in 1903. That will give connection with San Francisco. Grants Pass will have thereafter two strings to its bow.

It is proposed to put an ocean dredge at the mouth of the Columbia river to deepen the channel on the bar. When the jetty was first built a 34 foot channel was secured, but heavy westerly winds since and especially during the past winter have banked up the sands so that there is no more than 24 feet. It is reported that the bar at Liverpool, England, harbor is kept clear of sand by a sea dredger, and it is thought that the Columbia can be treated the same way.

The Grants Pass Observer reports that Jeff Gibson shot and killed his neighbor Schon Bachelor last week on Rogue river at the mouth of Jump-off-Jo. Bad blood had existed for a long time and on this particular day the quarrel was renewed. Gibson says that Bachelor started to shoot him with a shot gun but Jeff was too quick. He had the old man down with a Winchester bullet hole in his head before the shot gun could be brought to bear. Jeff is about 35 years of age while the dead man was 68. Gibson surrendered to the authorities and now awaits the action of the court.
