The Independent does not believe in a campaign of personalities. It is of the opinion that there are principles at stake which are far more important than any mere personal matters. It does not propose to be drawn into a campaign of personalities against the candidates of the opposition if it can be avoided. The Argus man, however, seems determined to have a personal campaign. Every issue of his paper has some personal fling at men whose only crime is that they are supporting the republican ticket. Last week it took a fling at the editor of the Independent. If this is what Mr. Long wants, the Independent will devote from the course heretofore pursued and will endeavor to give him personally as much of it as he wants. And the Independent, when it does come to deal with him, will not rely upon hearsay or prejudiced statements, but will take Mr. Long's own statements to dozens of respectable and responsible men in Hillsboro with reference to incidents in his past life, and his reasons therefor. It will dislike very much to do this and it hopes that it will not be compelled to do it. But either Mr. Long will stop his personalities, or else he will be given a dose of his own medicine so that he may see how he likes it.

The Hillsboro Republican club is preparing for a big meeting on Saturday of next week, May 17. It is arranging that Judge Williams will be one of the speakers.

REFORMS AND REFORMERS.

Mr. Chamberlain and his friends admit that if he is to be elected it will be by the aid of the votes of those who have heretofore acted with the republican party. Since republicans claim a plurality in the state reaching 10,000 or more, the admission of Mr. Chamberlain can be accepted as truth. But if he is to be elected it will be by an organized revolt of over 5,000 republicans. Individuals acting without concert will not do the work. Now there is no organization in the state that can be depended upon to elect Chamberlain unless it is the republicans in Multnomah county that unite with the democrats to form the fusion party which exists according to Oregonian charges and Evening Journal claims. This split from the republican party boastfully claims that it is U. S. Senator Simon's friends wherefore they are denominated Simon republicans. As to whether they will be numerous enough to cause the defeat of Mr. Furnish only the counting of the votes cast next month will disclose. But the consistency of the democratic party in fusing. Let an examination be made.

Our democratic friends are very anxious for reform. They think that republican legislation and republican administration in Oregon has been defective. But republican legislation and republican administration have been largely dominated by Mr. Simon and his friends. Now the democrats propose to reform Simon's methods and Simon legislation by endeavoring to elect a legislature and a state administration upon an alliance with Simon and his friends. The republicans think that matters have not gone just right and want a new deal. In doing this, they have selected new men. Democrats declare they want a new deal, but they enter into an alliance with the very men who have been responsible for the previous mistakes. Republicans think the best way to express disapprobation with past methods is not to reelect the men who are responsible for them. The democrats seem to think the best way to express their disapprobation is to enter into an alliance and carry the election by the help of men who are responsible for the bad methods. The republicans think the best way to change administration and legislation is to change men. Democrats seem to think the best way is to re-instate in power the men who brought about the very conditions they claim they desire to change.

Pertinent questions might be asked. What interest has Mr. Simon and his friends in the election of Mr. Chamberlain? Have Simon and his friends been accustomed to work in politics without some political compensations? What does Chamberlain, if elected, propose to give them? He admits, as above stated, that he cannot be elected without republican votes and he is plainly relying upon the votes of Simon republicans. Will he be a base ingrate? Will he repudiate the very men upon whom he depends for election? Will they have no votes in his administration, receive no favors from him? Does anybody believe they would support him if that were his attitude? If it is not his attitude, if he will be ordinarily grateful, what are the favors he would like to bestow?

THE SCUTTLE WILL HURT.

The democratic party in its platform declares that it favors granting to the Philippine Islands independence, retaining only coaling stations and such ports as may be necessary to protect the islands from foreign attack. That is, we are to be at the expense of maintaining a foreign government. That is scuttle. We bring home our army and our navy. We abandon the schools we have begun. Banks and merchants will be recalled so as to allow foreign capital to do the business of the Islands. How is Washington county to be affected? The splendid market for our hay will be ruined. We will not be in the fine condition we were in 1900 when Col. Liscom at the head of his magnificent 9th regiment went in six days up to Tin-Sin, China, to commence that wonderful campaign which released the foreign ministers. It was this same campaign which our merchants followed and entered the markets of Manchuria. The Clunax Milling Company sends flour there, so does the Crescent Mills at Forest Grove. So does the Gaston Mills. So does the Beaverton Mills. Our farmers' wheat goes into those mills. The flour goes to China and the bran and shorts back to the farm. England has put a duty of 17.44 cents on a barrel of flour and 14.49 cents on the wheat that makes it. This difference will turn the water of the wheels of our American mills, and the tax itself will so reduce the price of wheat that we cannot grow it. What we will have to do is to find another market. We can have it in Asia, but not with a scuttle policy. The policy of the re-

publican party has found us a selling place, and that policy will hold open the door. But we must have republican officials. True Mr. Chamberlain has repudiated the Philippine plank of his platform but he as governor will have no voice in national affairs. It is presumable that Mr. Weatherford endorses his party's scuttling policy. Opposed to him is Mr. Tongue. We know what he will do. Tongue is for holding the Philippines. His election insures, as far as one representative can, the continuance of the policy now in force. The voters of the county have further opportunity to fortify Roosevelt's administration. The representatives to the legislature from this county will vote for U. S. Senator. If republicans are sent they will vote for a republican and expansion. Their whole lives are pledged to that. If democrats are sent to Salem they will vote for C. E. S. Wood, who in 1890 helped nominate Palmer and Buckner on the gold democratic ticket, then in 1900 voted for Bryan and free silver. Now he stands on the democratic platform with auger in hand ready for the scuttling act. Washington county cannot afford to experiment with democratic officers this year when so much is at stake.

THE BEEF TRUST.

Six big meat companies organized a combine a few weeks ago and put up the price of meat. It is interesting to note how the two parties meet this monopoly. Consumers enter serious complaint, and stop eating meat. The combine answers that the excessive price of meat is only temporary, and due entirely to a short supply of beef cattle and mutton sheep, and that as soon as grass fattened stock comes on the market, former prices will be established.

This claim is admitted by the democratic party which vociferously demands that the duty on live stock be removed. The New York American and Journal, Herald paper, has a page of poster type which condensed an ordinary paragraph reads: "Hands up, be robbed, or go hungry! The tariff blow can be struck immediately. Congress if it so will, can at once repeal the Dingley duties, and let in free the mutton, beef and pork of Canada and Mexico. That would bring prices down on the run. Off with the tariff on beef, veal, mutton and pork. Let that be the cry of every victim of the food trust."

The Detroit Free Press, a democratic journal, in a recent issue quotes the duty on cattle, sheep and dressed meats, and adds, "The meat trust insists that the high prices are due to scarcity, and if this is the case, the removal of the duty would afford a remedy. The markets of the United States should be thrown open to Canadian cattle and sheep, as well as to refrigerated beef of Argentina and Australia. The demand for cheaper meats is immediate and immediate relief is not to be obtained through an appeal to the courts. It is congress, not the Attorney General, should act in a case like this. The only rational method of proceeding against the beef trust lies in the removal of the duties on meat."

This indicates that in the belief of the paper, it is useless to proceed against the beef trust, and that cheaper meats must be had by a removal of the tariff duties. As the large packers would still control the slaughtering and distribution of meats, it is not plain from whence relief would come to the consumer, besides it would be the farmer and the stock man that would be injured by the repeal of the tariff. This is the democratic remedy. This is the new departure called for by the Mississippi democracy in urging the democrats to turn from the West and ally themselves with the East. It means to strike at food products produced in the West and probably return to the old theory of free raw material. The tariff reform now demanded by the democracy is against the farmer more than against the manufacturer.

The republicans proceed differently—they want to know the condition, "where they are at." The republican club of New York took up the matter last week to get immediate relief. The trust magnates promised to meet the committee and then when the time came backed out. It was then determined by the New York Republican Club to invoke the law now in force and not wait for other enactments. Republican propose to do something. There is no evidence that there is a less number of cattle available this year than there were last or at any time for ten years. Republicans do not care to eat refrigerated beef from Argentine and Australia. Some refrigerated beef was tried during the Cuban campaign in 1895.
