U. S. SENATOR.

Certain persons who are interested in defeating the republican legislative ticket in this county, are circulating the report that the republican candidates for the legislature are pledged to vote for H. W. Scott for U. S. Senator. This statement is absolutely false. Mr. Scott has repeatedly stated both publicly and privately, that he is not a candidate for U. S. Senator, and the candidates of the republican party in Washington county take him at his word. They are not pledged to him or any other man, but if elected, when the time comes to elect U. S. Senator, will confer with their fellow members of the republican party and the people of Washington county and will vote for the man who appears to be the choice of the majority of the republicans of the state of Oregon.

A MAN ON THE TICKET.

Our contemporary, Mr. Long, seems to be exercised very much at the fact claimed by him that the republican state ticket is headed by a Cleveland democrat and that a Cleveland democrat is leading the republican forces in Washington county. He claims that some republicans objected to following the lead of these two Cleveland gentlemen. Now it really seems that if this is an argument against the republican ticket, it ought to fall with much stronger weight on the democratic ticket. What was Mr. Chamberlain? For Cleveland and Cleveland democracy in 1896. Where was Mr. Long? Where was every man on the state ticket? Where was every man leading the campaign on the democratic side? Where were the men who are now leading the democratic campaign in Washington county? Were not all these Cleveland men? It is true probably that most of them everlastingly damned Cleveland and everything pertaining to him a few years later, and then rushed into the arms of Bryan. The difference seems to be that the democrats who are voting with the republicans are the ones who refused to change their principles, when their party turned its back on its entire record, and upon every principle in which it had formerly professed to believe. Those on the other hand who are now leading the democratic state and county tickets were those who followed their party wherever it went, without regard to whatever principles it professed, who are simply following the name "democracy," and are now in Washington county and throughout the state, begging republicans to help this class of men win the political victories. They are asking republicans to refuse to recognize men who, formerly democrats, are now advocating the principles of the republican party, but ask them to endorse men who were formerly democrats, who then and now oppose with all their might, the principles advocated by the republican party, and yet they are asking republicans who believe in the principles of republicanism to vote such tickets.

THE MCKINLEY BILL AS A TARIFF FOR REVENUE ONLY.

While the democrats are in favor of a tariff for revenue, the Wilson bill was a notorious failure as a revenue producer. In a time of profound peace, the government sold over \$200,000,000 in bonds in order to keep up the expenses of the government. We are now engaged in putting down an expensive insurrection in the Philippine Islands. We are building up and strengthening the navy at a large expense, the war tax revenues have been repealed, yet the excess of receipts over expenditures for yesterday was \$68,636.48. For this month \$1,188,181.37; for this fiscal year \$67,481,457.99. In times of war through the ordinary revenues of the government, under the operation of the Dingley bill, the administration is paying off the debts accumulated by the Cleveland administration in time of profound peace under the operation of the Wilson law. And the burden of this increased taxation is really lighter than the less one of the Wilson tariff times when it was attempted to operate a "tariff for revenue."

WHAT A DEMOCRATIC HOUSE WOULD DO IN THE PHILIPPINES.

When the deficiency bill was before the House on January 24, the following amendment was proposed: "Insert after line four, page seven the following:—For the proper shelter and protection of officers and enlisted men of the army of the United States, lawfully on duty in the Philippine Islands, and to be expended in the discretion of the President, \$500,000." On a roll call the democratic members of the House voted with practical unanimity against this

amendment. This would seem to indicate that if the democrats had control of the House they would stop further proceedings in the Philippine Islands, by refusing to vote the necessary supplies for the army.

DEMOCRATIC SENATORS AND THE NICARAGUAN CANAL.

The democratic members of the senate seem determined that the Nicaraguan canal bill shall not be taken up for consideration until after the Oregon election. It is the next order of business after the Philippine bill has been disposed of. This bill has been the unfinished business of the senate since April 17. The republicans have been ready ever since to vote upon it. The democrats declined to permit it to come to a vote, until this week when they agree to vote on Tuesday June 3, the day after our election!

BELIEVES IN PROSPERITY.

John C. Young, Formerly a Leading Populist, Would Continue the Present Good Times and He is in Line for the Republican Ticket.

Hon. J. C. Young, of Baker City, formerly state chairman of the people's party, who is a keen political observer, has lately returned from a visit to California. He is now engaged in mining, tells a reporter at Albany that he is out of politics and adds: "I intend to vote the republican ticket this year. That party is serving the people well and I am willing to let well enough alone. What do we want anyway? Times are good, money is plentiful, property is increasing in value rapidly and the air is full of prosperity. Oregon and the Pacific coast is just on the verge of a wonderful boom, not the inflated article, but of a genuine healthy growth. We are just recovering from the Cleveland panic and I am going to vote to continue the present conditions. Democracy stands for nothing, in fact is nothing. They have all kinds of democrats, but the principal kind is the one for office only." Mr. Young said that the Eastern Oregon populists were fully satisfied with President Roosevelt and his stand on the trust question. "We have faith," said Mr. Young, "in the republican national and state administration and believe that they will handle these public questions in a better and more careful manner than it would be possible for Democracy to do. The republicans have given us the initiative and referendum, one of the leading laws advocated by the people's party and it remains for the people to carry it at the polls. Again I say, what do the democrats want?"

When asked about the vote for governor in Eastern Oregon he said, "Furnish will come to the Cascades with an overwhelming majority. The Chamberlain boom was stronger on the day of the democratic convention than it ever will be again."

EDSON DENIES AUTHORSHIP.

Morgan desired me to vote for him and as an inducement to do so promised me that if elected he would have me drawn upon the jury panel of Washington county, Oregon, and would get me drawn on the grand jury and would also get me drawn upon the grand jury of the United States court at Portland. He said his brother J. W. Morgan was an expert in those matters by reason of long experience in the clerk's office and understood how it was done.
