PORTLAND-HILLSBORO TROLLEY CAR LINE.

By reference to the advertisement at another place it is seen that the promoters of the Portland-Hillsboro electric car line is desirous of meeting the citizens of Hillsboro tomorrow evening at the courthouse to talk over plans for building car barns, perhaps powerhouses, and the routes through the city.

A trolley line is to be built into Washington county. The franchise through Portland has been granted and the referring the ordinance back to the council does not check work on the line.

But to get the most benefits Hillsboro must use exertion to locate here a division terminal. We want the powerhouse here. We want the repair shops here. We want the home residences of the employees to be established here.

PENSION INDIAN WAR VETERANS.

A meeting of the Indian war veterans of this county was held in the courthouse last Saturday to determine what is necessary and the best way to proceed to get their pensions for service performed in 1856-6.

Notice of the meeting had not reached all, hence it was not numerously attended. The work done was appointing a committee consisting of Lt. W. H. Meyers, Henry Wehrung and James Wilkes to confer with Congressman Tongue who is now at home, and find out what blanks will be required and how to get them and what proof is necessary to establish the claim.

The text of the bill which authorizes and directs the payment of the pension is in these words:

"The provisions, limitations and benefits of the act entitled 'An act granting pensions to survivors of the Indian wars of 1832 to 1842 inclusive, known as the Black Hawk war, Creek war, Cherokee disturbances and the Seminole war,' approved July 27, 1892, be and the same are hereby extended from the date of passage of this act to the surviving officers and enlisted men, including marines, militia and volunteers of the military and naval service of the United States who served for 30 days or more, and were honorably discharged under the United States military, states, territorial or provisional authorities in the Florida and Georgia Seminole Indian War of 1817 and 1818, the Fèvre Indian War of Illinois of 1827, the Sac and Fox Indian War of 1831, the Sabine Indian disturbances of 1836 and 1837, the Cayuse Indian war of 1847 and 1848, on the Pacific coast, the Florida wars with the Seminole Indians from 1842 to 1848 inclusive, the Texas and New Mexico Indian war of 1849 to 1856, the California Indian disturbances of 1851 and 1852, the Utah Indian disturbances of 1850 to 1853 inclusive and the Oregon and Washington territories Indian wars from 1851 to 1856 inclusive, and also to include the surviving widows of such officers and enlisted men, provided that such widows have not remarried; and provided, further, that where there is no record of enlistment or muster into the service of the United States in any of the wars mentioned in this act, the record of pay by the United States shall be accepted as full and satisfactory proof of such enlistment and service; and provided, further, that all contracts heretofore made between the beneficiaries under this act and pension attorneys and claim agents are hereby declared null and void."
