WILLAMETTE VALLEY AND STOCK.

Our land owners hardly realize what advantages they have in the fields and pastures of the Willamette Valley. The valley ought to become the home of breeding stock. The new blood that is almost annually injected into the herds and flocks of the grazing plateau between the Rocky mountains and the Cascades. It is a well known fact that sheep, cattle and horses attain greater size here than in the East and hence are chosen by the flock and herd masters in preference to eastern stock. The demand for this pure bred stock is almost if not quite inexhaustible.

What can be done is best illustrated by an example. Mr. Stump of Polk county has a fine flock of long wool sheep, and is a careful breeder. A few years ago he was selling his buck lambs to the butcher for \$2.50 each. A friend by guaranteeing \$3 per head induced him to ship an experimental car load to Yakima, Washington. After all expenses were paid \$9 per head was paid to Mr. Stump. Now he has a market at his door for all lambs that he raises at \$10 each. The same is true of other stock. Our valley is ideal for producing the best, and attention should be directed to that channel.

Democrats lampoon republicans because the party has not madly concluded reciprocity treaties with foreign nations, especially with Cuba. It is believed that the only interest democrats have in reciprocity is the hope that it will some way bring about free trade. But do our opponents realize what they concede when they urge reciprocity? that they concede a protective system? Free trade does not remove import duties but imposes a tax for revenue on foreign goods coming into our ports. Now this cannot be traded off except at the expense of revenue. A protective tariff is a necessity if reciprocity is to be used, and free traders recognize this, unconsciously perhaps, when they advocate the system. Free traders are not honest with themselves or the public when they urge their system of revenue. They would have us believe that a less amount of money is to be collected by a free trade schedule than by protection, but there is not. It is the same sum collected in another way, a way more burdensome to the people. Sugar is the main article on which a free trade revenue duty is laid, and if the duty is taken off sugar for reciprocity purposes, it must be put on some other article.

To Lucius Ananias Loug, editor of the Argus.—You have repeatedly charged the Independent with publishing scandal. Now will you make some attempt to prove this charge? Will you offer any evidence of its truth? Will you state when? Will you give the issue of the paper and the name of the article? If so the Independent will republish it and let the public judge whether or not your statement is true or false. A person who makes a charge of this kind ought to have some evidence to sustain it, and ought to be willing to produce it or at least to call attention to it when it is demanded. But the fact is Ananias that you will not do it because you cannot. The charge was false and you knew it to be so when you made it, and you were only demonstrating your right to wear the name of your celebrated ancestor.

It is asserted that we in the United States are burdened with trusts, monopolies, and the matter has not been denied. The tariff laws are charged with fostering the trusts. Is it true? Copper is on the free list yet there is a trust. There is a small duty on salt yet the trust is international, a trust in free-trade England, in protected France and in Spain of unknown revenue laws. There is no tariff on coal but there is a trust, a monopoly, so that if an oil mine were struck in Washington county, a gusher even, it would hardly be worth anything—could not sell the output. But the trust magnates are not satisfied. They propose to make the trust international and negotiations are actually in progress in London. The Independent is not yet convinced that the tariff is the father of trusts.

The Commoner denies that W. J. Bryan was invited to dine in New York with the Tilden Club. Where upon the chairman of the invitation committee digs up the receipts for

registered letters and finds the one sent to the famous Nehrskan. What became of the letter? Did he sign the receipt and lose the letter between the post office and the pen of the Commoner?

It is reported that the North Pacific Railroad Co. has bought the Mohr road and its franchises on the north side of the Columbia from above Celilo to below The Dalles. Three or four years ago this would have meant active war on the O. R. & N. Co. but now it may mean the removal of a competitor. However, it lets the N. P. down through the gorge of the Columbia which that road seems to have desired.
