THE DRIVER SHOT DEAD

AMERICAN BANDITS ROB A MEXICAN STAGE.

Driver Made an Heroic Attempt to Escape, but He Was Shot and Killed as He Made a Brilliant Dash for Safety.—Strong Box Looted.

Tucson, A. T., Aug. 12.—Three masked and mounted men held up the Mexican stagecoach, killed the driver and got away with the treasure box, containing \$4,000. At a ranch on the road, about half way between Maricopa and Phoenix, the robbers suddenly dashed up and ordered the driver to halt the horses. Instead of obeying the plucky fellow whipped his animals and tried to escape, but three bullets from rifles held by the highwaymen struck him and he fell dead. The robbers soon overtook the vehicle and brought it to a stop by cutting the traces. After securing the money box the thieves departed, leaving the passengers unharmed.

It has been discovered that the robbery was planned and executed by American outlaws, who have a camp somewhere in the Arizona mountains. A reward has been offered for their capture and an armed party is following their trail.

Such is the Report emanating from Moscow.

Moscow, Aug. 12.—The report is current in the highest official circles that the czar has seriously expressed his intimate conviction his desire to abdicate in favor of his brother, the Grand Duke Constantine Michael Alexandrovich.

His majesty is said to have become utterly disheartened at the internal condition of his country. He has neither the will power nor the physical strength to contend with the situation and with the retrogressing influence of which he is surrounded. The czar's announcement is expected next month, and if he does not present the czar with an heir his decision to abdicate will probably become irrevocable.

COLOMBIAN GOVERNMENT LIVES

Revolutionists Have Not Yet Been Successful.

Colon, Colombia, Aug. 12.—No definite news has reached here of the battle between government troops and revolutionists at Agua Dulce, but it is said that General Berti, the government leader, is still holding a strong position at Agua Dulce and has been able to break through weak points of General Herrera's lines for the purpose of obtaining cattle. Government reinforcements from Savannah are expected, however, early at the terminus. Nothing has been heard of the government gunboat Boyaca, which has been missing since July 20, when one left Panama with 300 men on board to reinforce General Berti at Agua Dulce.

CAPTURE AN INCENDIARY.

Believed That He Attempted to Burn Portion of Peoria, Ill.

Peoria, Aug. 12.—The police have arrested Edward Flanagan, 20 years old, charging him with incendiarism. They think an attempt was made to destroy the business part of the city. Shortly after noon fire broke out at the Clark flouring mill. Flanagan was looking through a window and was seen to throw something into the building and then walk hurriedly around the block. He was followed and after the firemen had arrived at the fire he returned and watched them work.

An attempt was made to fire the warehouses and offices of the Val Bate Brewing company. A residence was fired early yesterday morning. At 1 o'clock Neumiller's livery barn and thirty-seven horses were destroyed. The barn was within a few blocks of the brewing company's plant.

APPOINTS SON OF POET.

Oliver Wendell Holmes, Son of the Poet, Honored by Roosevelt.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 12.—President Roosevelt late yesterday afternoon announced his appointment of Oliver Wendell Holmes, chief justice of the supreme court of Massachusetts, to be an associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, vice Justice Gray, resigned.

Judge Holmes is one of the most distinguished lawyers and jurists of Massachusetts. He is the son of the late Dr. Holmes, the poet.

Violent Storm in Canyon.

Redding, Cal., Aug. 12.—Not within memory of any resident of the Sacramento canyon has an event of such a storm been experienced as that which wrought damage to machinery and frightened timid people last night. At 7:30 a succession of thunder peals began, accompanied by vivid flashes of lightning. Except when rain was pouring down this continued for hours.

Dunsmuir had a similar experience. Its lighting plant was burned out and its system seriously injured.

Think "Huckleberry Finn" Immortal.

Denver, Aug. 12.—"Huckleberry Finn," Mark Twain's story of boy life on the Mississippi river, has been elected from the Denver public library as the ground that it is immortal and unchangeable.

TANN WAS A DESPERATE MAN

Many Visit Madonna to View the Dead Bandit's Remains.

San Jose, Aug. 12.—Not since the days of the murder of the family of Colonel McGinnis at Campbell, by James Dunham, seven years ago, has there been such a sensational effort at crime accomplished as the doing of the two young men, George Tann and Fred Williams, who on Saturday ran the gamut of full-fledged highwaymen for three hours in the vicinity of Coyote and Madonna and ended their careers, the first by suicide and the second by peacefully submitting to arrest.

All in all, it may be said that the three hours in which the highwaymen pursued their calling were among the most exciting in the history of the southern end of the county. The two men came unbidden, and they departed, one dead, without regrets, as far as the people of that portion of the county were concerned. It is doubtful if in the annals of crime there was ever recorded a more foolhardy and at the same time a more desperate effort than Tann and Williams undertook. From all that can be learned it was unprovoked. They would seem to have become intoxicated with the spirit of desperate adventure only after they had started to leave the city. Then they rushed like madmen to the gallows or the penitentiary, or other doom.

With all their crimes the two bandits secured but \$18. They took from one victim, A. J. Bardsley, a horse trader of East San Jose, \$30, but \$15 was returned. The balance was acquired in small collections.

The officers have learned that Tann, the dead man, is an ex-convict. He was sent to San Quentin from Redwood City in 1897 for highway robbery and arson for five years. He was then 19 years of age. Upon his release he turned his hand to ranching. Shortly afterward he and Mateo county has telegraphed that he could with Tann the most desperate man he had ever had to deal with officially.

Williams had been in Mayfield. He is but 19 years of age and his father is a carpenter and contractor well known in that community. He has four sisters and brothers. A month ago he got into trouble in a drinking bout and attacked the town marshal and was arrested for assault and battery. Pending his trial he jumped his bail and was not heard from until Saturday, although a bench warrant for his arrest has been in the office of the sheriff since July 24.

Williams told the officers a full account of the events leading up to the acts that led to the death of Tann, which he is inclined to believe. He said that he first met Tann on July 4 last. Both were then looking for a job, and they secured employment of a thresher on the ranch of A. G. Moore near Mountain View. A few days of work was all that either wanted, and Williams returned to Mountain View while Tann pursued his way in other directions. A few days later Williams got drunk and the trouble with the officers in Mayfield and Mountain View and his subsequent jumping of his bail caused him to flee the country in a limited sense. He came to San Jose with a companion named Frank Robles of Mayfield, and the two, pending their final employment, took to camping on Guadalupe creek, near the Valley View school house. Robles and Williams secured odd work on the ranches and with little dyes in that vicinity. Williams says he was employed for a time on the Costa dryer on the Alameda road.

According to Williams the two men had no ammunition in their weapons until they entered the Twelve-Mile house, where they purchased a box of cartridges for the pistol, after which they proceeded immediately to "hold up everybody." He says that he was forced to play the part of "searcher" under threats of Tann, who told him he would kill him if he balked. He says that it was his intention to go to Bakersfield or Fresno, where both have friends.

Particulars of Ragade's Death.

Santa Rosa, Aug. 12.—Particulars of the death of Charles N. Ragade, son of United States Consul Ragade at Tien Tsin, have just been received here in a letter from the superintendent of the Mexican Anthracite Coal Mining company at San Jacinto, Mexico. The accident which resulted in the death of the young man occurred on July 17. Mr. Ragade had been superintending the repairs on a gas-line pump, and when the work was completed he took charge of the pump. A few moments later there was a terrific explosion, from what cause is not known. The force threw Ragade and three men near at hand a distance of forty feet. The young man struck on a pile of timber and both legs were broken by the force. Before he could be removed the timber took fire from the burning gasoline and he received fatal burns. He lingered twenty-four hours in the most intense suffering.

Consul Ragade was immediately informed by cable of his son's tragic end. The Ragade family resided in Santa Rosa for many years. An elder brother of the deceased died shortly after the Tien-Tsin siege from exposure and hardships during that trying time.

Fresno Brewer Dead.

Fresno, Aug. 12.—Ernest Elliott, head of the Fresno Brewing company, is dead in this city from heart failure, following a recent attack of rheumatism. Elliott and relatives came from Wisconsin about three years ago and established here the Fresno brewery, the pioneer and one of the finest and most modern plants, and one of the show places of the city.

C. bull, Khehive also sired Tormentor and Miss Sharpless, test 29 lbs 14 oz; Ona, test 22 lbs 10 oz; was also granddam of Oxford Kate, test 39 lbs 12 oz in seven days, which was the highest testing cow ever imported by T. N. Cooper, who has gleaned the Island's best bred animals for years. Fillpall's Countess 24462 also traces to Commae through her sire, Count St. George 8403, who is a grandson of Koffee 233.

PROGRESS IN IRRIGATION.

The progress in agriculture in the arid states and territories during the decade ending with 1899 is shown in the report just published by the Division of Agriculture of the 12th Census. As this progress is attributable largely to irrigation, the statistics relating thereto are of general interest.

The number of irrigators in the United States in 1899, not including irrigators of rice, was 108,218, an increase in ten years of 99 per cent. The area irrigated was 7,509,545 acres, an increase of 107.6 per cent. Of this area, 5,944,412 acres were in crops, and 1,565,133 acres in pasture and unimproved crops. The cost of irrigation systems in operation, exclusive of those on rice plantations, was \$67,770,912, while the value of the irrigated crops was \$35,500,491.

The total length of all the main ditches in the arid and semi-arid states and territories was 44,149 miles.

The average number of irrigated acres in farms in arid states and territories was 71; the average value of irrigated lands per acre, \$42.53; the average value of crops produced on irrigated land, \$14.51; the average first cost of water, \$7.50; the average annual cost of maintenance, \$9.35. Of the 5,711,965 acres in crops, hay and forage occupied 3,625,654, or 64.2 per cent; cereals, 1,309,709, or 24.5 per cent; vegetables, 168,432, or

2.9 percent; orchard fruits, 251,280, or 4.4 per cent; other crops, 226,851, or 4.0 per cent. The value of the hay and forage was \$34,834,966; cereals, \$11,338,325; vegetables, \$9,627,491; orchard fruits, \$8,920,409; other crops, including sub-tropical fruits, grapes, flowers, plants, sugar beets, etc., \$16,712,245.

In Oregon the number of irrigators increased from 3,160 in 1889 to 4,636 in 1899, or 47.2 per cent, and the number of acres irrigated from 177,944 to 388,310, or 118.2 per cent. The ditches in operation in 1899 had a length of 2,284 miles, cost \$1,638,782, and irrigated 388,111 acres. There were 199 acres irrigated from wells. The irrigated area in crops was 236,250 acres, yielding products valued at \$3,062,926. The area irrigated in pasture and unimproved crops was 98,064 acres.

Shortly after sending the irrigation bill to the President, congress passed a resolution authorizing the Director of the Census to compile statistics relating to irrigation for the crop year of 1902. With the data now assembled, this work will be comparatively simple, most of it being done by correspondence. To secure this information inquiries will soon be sent out to irrigators throughout the United States. The co-operation of those interested in irrigation is earnestly solicited for upon their prompt response will depend very largely the value of these statistics. This is in part a supplementary work the results of which will be utilized in the work soon to be undertaken by the Department of the Interior under the provisions of the irrigation bill.

Articles of incorporation have been filed in the sum of \$500,000 creating a company to build a railroad from Biggs, the Columbia river terminus of the Columbia Southern to The Dalles. This new road may be used to serve two purposes, first, as a connection between the terminus of the Columbia Southern and the navigable waters of the Columbia river below The Dalles, and secondly as a portage road around the unnavigable portion of the river. The O. R. & N. does not need the road, since it has one between the two points hence it is assumed that the Columbia Southern which runs on the divide between the Des Chutes and John Day rivers, is to be a competing line.

NEWS OF THE STATE.

The Southern Pacific Company has sent 50 refrigerator cars to Medford to be loaded with peaches and Bartlett pears.

A fire at McMinnville last week destroyed the plant of the News. The wire fence works of that place were also burned.

Custer Relief Corps of McMinnville presented the city with a flag last week. The city council is the agency receiving the gift.

The Oregon State Bank was opened at Junction, Marion county, August 8, with a capital stock of \$25,000. J. A. Aupperin is president and E. W. Hazard is cashier.

Marion county is still paying \$5 per day to two accountants to check the books and accounts of the county officers. Clark & Buchanan are the ones getting the money.

A fire which has been burning in the hills near the Big Mining Company and is to be immediately placed on the company's property at the foot of Champion Canyon in the Bohemia district.

Ester and Emery Davis, age 6 and 5 years, were burned to death at Klamath on Wednesday night, August 6. While playing with matches they exploded a five gallon can of oil and were instantly bathed in flames.

Salem has not been able to collect its dog tax, so an example is to be made of about a dozen leading citizens who will be arrested for a violation of a city ordinance in that they persist in keeping a dog and refuse to pay a license for the privilege.

Rosco Hughes of La Grande, met with a peculiar accident on the night of August 7. Hearing a commotion in his father's barn he entered and stumbled, falling on the pitchfork, the tines of which entered the lower portion of the abdomen. His injuries are not considered very dangerous by the attending physician.

A bull dog viciously attacked Frank Snook of Wapato last week while he was walking along the road on Bald Peak. Snook is an elderly man and the dog was about to overpower him when Dr. Myers rescued the man by killing the dog. The lacerations of the face are considerable.

The Davis case is to be appealed to the supreme court. The circuit court of Marion county found that Davis, clerk of school land board, is short in his accounts but as the action was not commenced within six years after the default, the court held that the bondsmen are not liable. The attorney general thinks they are, and will test the matter in the higher court.

Manager James Winstanley, of the Oregon Hopgrowers' Association, has received advices from New York reports the Salem Sentinel, to the effect that 30 to 35 cents has been offered in that state for hops of the crop of 1902. Based upon this news, Mr. Winstanley concludes that 25 cents or better will soon be offered in Oregon. There is always a difference of 4 cents per pound between the prices in New York and in Oregon.

The Salem Military band has decided to accept the offer of entertainment at the fairs of the enterprising citizens of Newport, and go next Monday, August 11, to take a two-week vacation at that popular resort. They will go fifteen strong in full uniform, and give daily concerts for the delight of the crowds at Newport. The band is stronger as a playing organization than ever before in its history, and the outing will be very much appreciated by the people of the bay, as well as by the members of the band.—Albany Herald.

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
