Cuba is slow in submitting her draft of a reciprocity treaty. It has not left Havana yet, and so much secrecy is maintained that Secretary Hay has sent Col. Bliss to Cuba to find out if possible, the conditions now existing there.

It has been intimated that Pres. Palma will not write a reduction of duty in the sugar schedule of 20 per cent of the Dingley bill, but that he wants more or about 50 per cent. Secretary Hay has been consulting senators relative to the size of the reduction that can be incorporated in the treaty and have it ratified. Such investigation seems to point to 20 per cent as a rebate that would be acceptable. A larger figure would probably cause the rejection of the treaty. But just why President Palma wants a greater rebate is not clear. Such a large per cent cannot be asked unless the Cubans are willing to grant corresponding large discounts on goods going from this country. That would interfere with Cuban revenue and it is believed that they can not spare a dollar out of their income.

The subject brings forward for re-reading the testimony taken before the Congressional Committee last spring. It was said that the Cuban laborers would starve if no relief came. They were not starving then and are not now. The market for sugar is looking up, so that it begins to appear as if the sugar industry of Cuba can take care of itself.

The real contest is between the American sugar monopoly and the Beet Sugar Companies. It was stated in a news report telegraphed this week from Washington that the "Beet Sugar Trust" is organizing for the conflict in the Capitol this winter. The same dispatch might have stated that the American Sugar Company is already organized. It was never disorganized, but retained its offices and agents in Washington all summer. It was testified last spring that if a rebate on the sugar duty were allowed the price the consumer pays for sugar would not be less than it now is. The American Sugar Co. champions Cuban reciprocity; and it is fair to suppose that it expects benefits. The benefits is a lower price for raw sugar. If the price to the consumer is not to be diminished then the gain that lies between what the consumer pays and the lower price that the refiner pays for raw sugar goes into the coffers of the sugar trust. The reason why we get sugar this fall for five cents instead of 5 1/2 is the competition between the American Sugar trust and the Beet sugar trust. By all means let us foster the strife between these people. And since Cuba by reason of the improvement in the Sugar market of the World, does not need the aid as was supposed last spring, we will make no great mistake if this New Cuban reciprocity treaty is rejected.

Gov. Geer has answered the petition of the Multnomah Tax-Payers League which asked him to call a special session of the Legislature. The Governor denies the petition so no special session will be here.

If Portland shows a disposition to brow beat in the matter of the Lewis and Clark appropriation an opposition will be aroused that will endanger the passage of any bill. The Multnomah County delegation is not a working majority of the legislature, and an attempt to organize a close corporation will put in jeopardy its most cherished measures.

Pres. Elliot of Harvard College, at a banquet eaten in Boston on the evening of the 10th, discussed to some length the question of organized labor. He defended the Seab declaring that he is a hero and in the class of the battle scared veterans of the American army and navy. Against this defense a correspondent in Portland evening paper writes but he appears to be a man too small to advance the cause he espouses.

The injunction dissolving the Salt Trust of the Pacific Coast has been made perpetual. Apponents of the administration have been fond of stating that Attorney General Knox is not in earnest. Here is an instance that indicates that he is. Now then, we will soon see what effect the enforcement of the present Anti-Trust law will have on prices. If we do not have cheaper salt it will be because the present statute is not sufficient and there must be further legislation.

If the Portland delegation wants its new charter bill and will lay it on the members desks, printed in regular bill form the first day of the session, they can have it ready for the governor's signature by the next afternoon. Opposition to the bill, if there is any, will come from Portland's own people.

Pres. Gompers, president of the Federation of Organized Labor attacks President Elliott of Harvard University. Says that Elliott is to be compared with Benedict Arnold, and that Judas was a Saint compared with the Harvard man. In the affairs of the world, which is the bigger man?

A volcano in Guatemala, Central America, known as Santa Maria, has been active and many Coffee plantations have been destroyed by being buried with ashes. No direct news comes from the district and it is feared that the silence is due to the destruction of all life.

LARGEST GOLD RESERVE.

In the aggregate gold holding in the United States treasury there was an increase since October 1 of \$10,000,000, the amount now being \$600,302,194, the largest sum in gold ever accumulated by any government. A few years ago, when engaged in an effort to establish a gold basis, Russia accumulated \$38,000,000, which to that time, was the largest body of gold ever accumulated in the possession. The United States has surpassed that \$38,000,000. But while the aggregate gold holding of the treasury shows an increase of \$16,000,000, in the net holdings there was a decrease since the last statement was made. One month ago the gold in the treasury's available cash was upward of \$136,000,000, while it is now in round numbers \$118,000,000, a decrease of \$22,000,000.
