The County Court has ordered that the tax levy for the year 1902 be as follows: State, 6.5 mills; school, 5 mills; indigent, 1; county, 11.4 mills; road fund, 4 mills on each dollar of all the taxable property, making a total of 27 mills.

The funeral of our late Congressman and fellow townsman, Honorable Thomas H. Tongue, will take place in this city on Sunday, January 18th, the arrangements of which are published elsewhere. A large number of people from other parts of the

difficult region through which to build a railroad, the company appears to be exercising great care so as to get the best route. So far as outsiders can guess, the new road will leave the Oregon and California east of Beaverton, perhaps a third or half way between that station and Raleigh and proceed in a south-easterly direction leaving Crescent Cemetery to the left, touch Fanno creek about the Hicklin donation land claim and perhaps follow that bottom down till the Willamette division is intersected. The Company has a heavy grade over the hill by Bertha and a heavier one on the Willamette division between Newberg in Yamhill county and Sherwood in this, and it is determined to have by the change a practical water grade into Portland. If there were a track down Front street, Portland from the Jefferson street station to Union depot, the problem would be quite simple, but in the absence of that, it will be necessary to bridge the Willamette at or near Oswego, and go in on the present eastside tracks. If the line is built the country from Beaverton to Tualatin will be well served and will boom as it has not done heretofore, notwithstanding it is already one of the wealthiest parts of the country.

Last night, occurred the annual meeting of the Congregational Church. News of the death of Congressman Thomas H. Tongue, which occurred in Washington, D. C., Sunday, at 12:30 p. m. was received in Corvallis with profound regret. Mr. Tongue has ably represented the first congressional district of Oregon for the past six years, and has made his impress upon national legislation since his incumbency. He was held in high esteem by his colleagues and had the confidence of the administration. Oregon will suffer irreparable loss by his death. He was chairman of the irrigation committee, which is rapidly assuming the importance of the committee on rivers and harbors, of which he was also a member. His place at the head of that committee meant much for the arid sections of this state. The loss of so efficient a worker, coming just at this time when the state is to send a new man to the senate, will greatly affect Oregon's interests at Washington. —Corvallis Gazette.

THE LATE THOMAS H. TONGUE.



Thos. H. Tongue was born in England June 23, 1844 and died January 11, 1903, aged 58 years. He came to Washington County at the age of 15 with his father Anthony Tongue, who survives him. He graduated at Pacific University in the class of 1868. He was admitted to the bar in 1870. He served one term in the state senate, and in 1896 was elected to congress by a very narrow majority. Bryan carried his district later in the same year by a large plurality. In 1898 party men predicted his defeat, but he was returned by an increased majority. The plurality grew in 1900, and in 1902 the plurality was above 5000.
