Diamonds are reported to have been found in Oregon, in the Blue Mountain range, forty miles from Burns, in Harney county. They occur in a bed of volcanic ash, and it is said that capital with which to prospect the ground where they occur will be provided. Diamonds have been found also in California in several locations. One from Butte county weighed above three carats. In Wisconsin also fair diamonds have been found in alluvial wash and some of these were marketable. There is no reason to doubt that the segregation of carbon from eruptive rocks, resulting in the formation of diamonds, may have occurred in other countries than Brazil or South Africa. The most important occurrences of diamonds in the United States have been those noted in California, but no field of prospective commercial importance is in sight.
