Master Frank Frazier, nephew of Mrs. J. W. Sewell has the scarlet fever. He had come to Hillsboro on a visit while his father and mother were visiting relatives in the east. A trained nurse from Portland is taking care of him. Wednesday he was very low, but at last accounts he was improving.

E. L. Abbott, who was formerly in the furniture business in this city and R. P. Simon have purchased the stock of secondhand goods belonging to F. R. Bailey, and have opened up for business next door to the INDEPENDENT. At present this firm is the only one handling second hand goods, exclusively in town.

"By request" Senator Sweek has introduced in the Senate a bill to prohibit photographers from carrying on their business on Sunday. The bill is Senate bill 215. It is practically the same as Gault's House bill on the same subject, which went down to ignominious defeat a few days ago. When Senator Sweek introduced the bill today, he placed emphasis on the "by request" phrase.

The Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Co., are doing quite a thriving business in this city lately. The local central has put in about a dozen private and business phones within the past two months. This is considered quite a rush, and if business continues in the future as it is at present, Hillsboro will be entitled to a night operator soon, which will be a great convenience to the public. There are at present something more than 70 telephones connected with central, and when the number reaches the 100 mark, we will have a night operator.

The best minstrel show that has appeared in this city for years was Ward's Minstrels, which played in the Opera House last Wednesday evening. The house was well filled with a very appreciative audience, and encores were cheered for on almost every number. While some of the jokes were old, as is almost always the case, the troupe made up any deficiencies with their excellent singing and fine music. It is safe to say that the conformation with this company is the best that has ever appeared in Hillsboro, and he received quite an ovation, as did also, the solo cornetist. The street parade during the noon hour was quite a feature, the brass band being much better than is usually the case with most traveling organizations. Should this company favor Hillsboro with another engagement in the future, they will undoubtedly have a good house.

The Pacific Coast Condensed Milk Factory at Forest Grove was started last Tuesday. This new industry will be a great thing for Washington county for it is conservatively estimated that this factory will be the means of distributing the first year, not less than \$300,000. The promoters of this company realize that this county is especially adapted to dairying. Their buildings are substantial and they are here to stay. While their buildings have been in progress they have made a careful survey of the surrounding country and they are much pleased with the outlook for their business. Many farmers who have depended on raising only grain heretofore for a livelihood will now keep cows, as there is a ready market for their product at the condenser. A few creamery men fear that they will have to close down because the condenser promises to be more profitable to the farmer. This the creamery men ought to forbid by paying as much for milk as the condenser. Make good butter if you please, pay a little more for your cream, charge us a little more for your butter and we will not kick.

The estate of the late Congressman Thomas H. Tongue has been admitted to probate, there being no will. E. B. Tongue, the elder son, has been appointed administrator, and has filed his bond in the sum of \$70,000. The estate is unofficially valued at \$35,000, and will be divided as follows: Widow, one-third; the balance share and share alike to the following children: Mrs. A. E. Reames, Jacksonville; E. B. Tongue, Mary, Thomas H., Jr., Bertha, Hillsboro; Mrs. Frank Freeman, Portland, and Miss Florence, student at Pacific University.

Wednesday, the Hotel Hillsboro changed hands. The purchaser is C. H. Jeremiah, who recently came to the city from Missouri. Mr. Jeremiah has been conducting a restaurant on Main street for some months, and evidently sees a future in the hotel business. Mr. Northrup, the retiring landlord has conducted this hotel for many years, and it is needless to say that he has had a good patronage and business standing. Mr. Jeremiah has already taken possession, but Mr. Northrup will continue to make his home in this city.

The four year old daughter of Mr. Peterson, of Hillsboro was frightfully burned last Tuesday while playing near the fire place. The child's clothes caught fire and burned her hands, arms and face. Had it not happened that its mother was standing near by and had the presence of mind to smother the flames, the little child would have burned to death. Dr. F. A. Bailey was hurriedly called and did all that could be done for the little sufferer. At last accounts she was resting easily, but will be badly scarred through life.

While climbing over a log something happened to the trigger of his gun, it was discharged tearing away the great toe and shattering the bones of the left foot. Dr. F. J. Bailey was summoned and dressed the wound, but being of such a serious nature where the most careful attention is needed the doctor recommended that the patient be taken to the hospital, Tuesday evening he was removed to the St. Vincent hospital.

The House passed a bill today to protect subcontractors, materialmen and laborers who furnish material or labor for construction of public works. Contractors are to be required to give bond, and any person working under such contractor shall be furnished with a copy of the contract and bond, upon which suit may be brought to recover for labor or materials supplied. The bill was introduced by Mr. Simmons.

A bill relating to commitments to Reform School passed the House yesterday. It places authority to make commitments solely in County courts, and to require parents or guardians of minors to pay \$10 per month for maintenance when such parents or guardians are financially able to do so. The bill was framed at Portland by the Taxpayers League and was introduced by Representative Nottingham.

Recently chickens were stolen and taken to a merchant in this city. He bought them. The owners found their chickens and the offender was soon found. It happened to be a young boy. Upon his father being informed of the facts he immediately called upon Deputy District Attorney Tongue and settled for the boy. Tongue discharged the boy pending good behavior. It is thought by some of our residents that other boys are practicing the same profession and let this be a warning or they will be liable to the law, which is very apt to be more strongly interpreted the next offense.
