Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar has apportioned among the several counties of the state the \$23,365.90 recently received from the United States treasury on account of the 5 per centum land sales fund, for the year 1903. The apportionment was made according to the acreage of the several counties. Washington has 420,381 acres of land within her borders, and the amount apportioned to her was \$171.48. Multnomah county got \$108.56 as her share. Benton county got \$159.84.

Died: At Schoils, Or., April 1st, 703, Robert R. Adams, aged 41 years son of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Adams of Schoils, Oregon. Robbie was the youngest child of the family, a bright and promising boy. He was known by the entire community and was loved by all who knew him. The bereavement falls heavy on parents and family. They have the sympathy of the entire community. Funeral services were held at the residence, April 21, conducted by Rev. J. Saper.

Mr. Wm. Bagley built a tank house this spring on which he set a redwood tank of 5000 gallons capacity. On top of the tank house is the windmill to furnish power for pumping. From the ground to the bottom of the tank was 32 feet. The tank set on jacks two by ten inches and 16 feet long. There was no center support. The pump was on the inside of the house which at the base was twenty feet or more square. A stairway was built to the top of the tower. Mrs. Bagley had a fruit room constructed in the tank house, which was filled with glass jars full of fruit. Everything was new and was just completed. Mr. J. C. Lankin, plumber, was about to finish adjusting pipes. On Friday last the tank was filled for the first time, with 5000 gallons of water that weighs about eight pounds to the gallon. Total weight 20 tons. This was too much for the two by ten joist. These broke immediately under the tank and the whole mass of water fell to the ground floor, stripping the whole of the inside fittings—stairs, pipes, pumps, fruit room, and breaking every fruit jar. Not a drop of water seems to have been spilled till the great tub struck the floor, when every stove was broken. The floor was on, and two of the sills were washed from the foundations. Everything was wrecked except the wind motor on top of the building. Mr. Lankin was on the outside at his bench. When he heard the first cracking he commenced running, and it is told that he ran for an hour. The crash was a great one and was heard by neighbors a mile away. The loss is put at \$1000.

Roy Heater is the Oregon wonder and is probably the best all-around man in Oregon. He hails from Newberg. He is an Oregon boy with some good records, but new as a trainer. W. O. Trine is an old hand at the business and is generally believed to be the best trainer on the Coast. He is a middle-aged man, and has spent a good many years studying the profession. He holds some world's records, and it would not be at all surprising if he develops a winning team at Corvallis, for he has a large crowd to draw from.

The sheriff has collected a little over \$90,000 of tax money the past month. This leaves only \$20,000 yet to be collected. Sheriff Sewell is to be congratulated upon the manner in which he has run the office. for \$25. Mark Hanna is one of the finest horses in Oregon. San Toy, a chestnut filly sold for \$500, and Rockface brought \$455. Ben Bolt was sold to a lady for \$450. He has probably participated in his last race. Prices ran down on some of the less generally known and younger horses. Fairly good prices were realized for yearlings and two-year-olds, and G. J. Rose, of Portland, paid \$280 for a chestnut gelding, foaled in 1901, and \$200 was paid for a black filly who is a full sister to San Toy. The sale netted the estate nearly \$8000 and is considered very good. This is the first attempt at a sale in Portland, and horsemen generally are pleased. A large number of horses besides Mr. Tongue's will be auctioned off today and tomorrow. Sales of this kind are familiar affairs in the East and will probably become so here as the first one was so successful.
