Miss Eva Fletcher is the guest of Miss Hesse Haden this week.

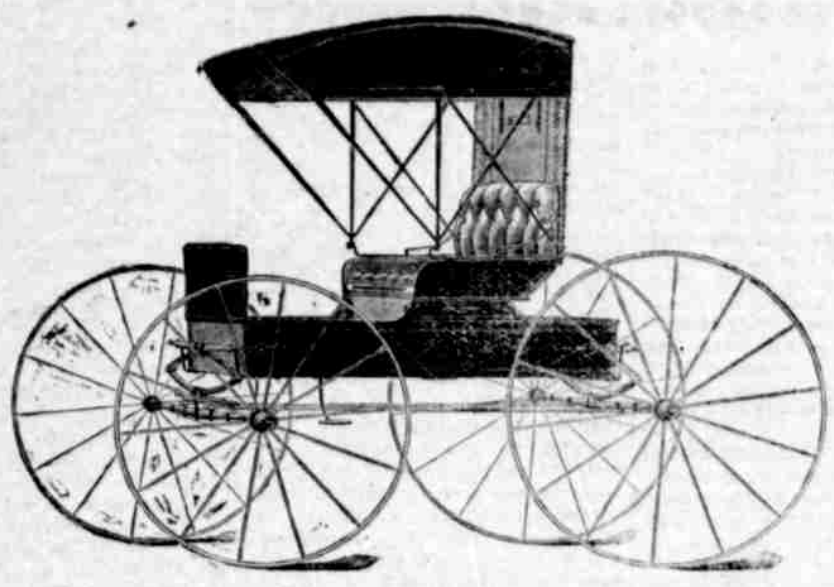
NEHALEM RAILROAD.
