A somewhat interesting question from the county school superintendents office is to go to the circuit court for review at the November term.

A family composed of father, mother and five children are in doubt as to their residence for school purposes. For several years the children have been enumerated in Dist. No. 90 and again in Dist. No. 86. Supt. Ball this year cancelled the enumeration in Dist. No. 90 and allowed it to stand in Dist. 86. From this decision the appeal is taken to the circuit court. Some years ago the householders settled a homestead in Dist. 86 where he residence and cultivation after which he rented a farm in Dist. No. 90, where he and his family have resided for the past five years, but he has claimed his residence in Dist. 86 where his homestead lies. He has voted there, worked road tax there and had his children enumerated there. On the other hand Dist. No. 90 wants the money which five children will bring to that district. The children attend school in Dist. 90, which fact is not denied. The question to be decided, can man fix his residence by verbally claiming it or does his acts determine where he in law owes allegiance?

Word comes that the S. P. Co. surveyors were on Tuesday last in the timber on the Lewis place near Farmington. They had been there three days and were not yet out of the brush. Engineer McLeod is superintending a transit and a level crew, altogether 14 or 15 men.

Subject, "The National Congress in War Time." The instructor has been West during the summer, visiting California first. The institute work in this county will be inspirational rather than didactic. This because of the short session. President Reeder, of the State Normal School, will occupy one evening of the session, and perhaps submit to interrogatories during the day. Another outsider is City Supt. Traver, of Salem. Supt. Traver was once a resident of this county, having taught the Beaverton school. Since leaving here he has risen rapidly in his profession, and is now recognized as one of the educational leaders of the state.
