Representative D. M. C. Gault attended the Press Association of which he is an ex-president and last year's chairman of the legislators committee, at Salem last week, returning Monday morning. Mrs. Gault, who accompanied him, returned Monday evening.

Mr. Birdsell, of Grangeville, Idaho, arrived last week to visit his sisters, Mesdames E. L. McCormick and John Dennis, and looked after property interests in this county, his farm near Reedville and his father's place in the suburbs of Forest Grove. He will probably remain a week or ten days longer.

The railway station was enlivened Saturday evening during the stay of the down train by the college yell of the victorious Columbia University team and their supporters who enthusiastically announced their success at Forest Grove over Pacific University's football heroes. There were whisperings that at the Forest Grove depot the Portland visitors had had their crowing concert disturbed by a shower of poultry in the shell, an attention intended for the too partisan referee but threatening all alike as the missiles scattered.

The Climax Mill, which has a 90-barrel capacity, is shipping in two carloads of grain a week, about half of which is for the local market and the rest "ground in transit," which means that the railway company ships grain from up the valley, allows it a stop over on the way when it is turned into flour and the flour then carried to Portland at the same cost as though the grain had been carried straight through. The scarcity of wheat in this vicinity has made such an arrangement necessary. About ten times as much barley as wheat is now raised in the county. Shovels and oats, and oil meal too, are now brought in by the millers who find a growing demand among the farmers who are increasing their dairy herds as fast as cows can be secured.

The district school board, Directors S. B. Huston, R. H. Greer and R. B. Collins and Clerk Peter Boscow, met Monday evening and audited a few small bills. The payroll amounts to \$400 a month and the district has on hand enough for four months while a small amount will be received from the county before the close of the year and in January comes the tax. Next year the new law takes effect, giving 46 for each child of school age or about \$3200 for Hillsboro. The district has been paying off the bonded indebtedness, incurred in building a \$10,000 school use, at the rate of \$1000 a year and now has half paid. Wages cost \$150 and there are some incidental expenses but a slight tax will make possible an eight months' term as the custom has been, pay off the thousand dollars and still leave money for further improvements. The school house was insured a year ago at \$5000 for three years and has paid the premium for that period and was paid not very long ago so that there are no heavy items outside the usual running expenses.

Of interest to school officers is an opinion just given by Attorney General Crawford upon request of State Supt. Ackerman, which holds that where a pupil is transferred from one district to another, it is the duty of the Board of Directors to transfer that pupil's proportion of the school funds to the district to which the child removes. If the Board of Directors of the first district refuses to transfer the money a mandamus proceeding may be brought by the parents of the child to compel the directors to perform their duty. It is also held that where the child is transferred before a county apportionment, the County Superintendent must distribute the money according to the school census and the transfer be made after by the district officer.

The Independent press, which has been thoroughly overhauled during the last ten days and put in first class condition, is an example of the lasting qualities of good workmanship. Built in New York City in 1862, it was the second cylinder press ever coming to the Pacific Coast, and, as the first went to the bottom of the sea, first used here, for six years running off the issues of the Portland Oregonian. Then it was outgrown, stored for a while and again came into use when the Hillsboro Independent had passed its hand press days and needed a quicker method of printing. For nearly a third of a century it has done good work in the same office, chronicling the news of Washington County and heralding its advantages, past the memory of most of its readers. The makers of such durable machinery have met with the success their good workmanship merited and "R. Hoe & Co.", which appeared on the drum cylinder of 1862, is also borne by the mammoth perfecting press which today prints the Oregonian as it has been on every press in the transition from drum cylinder to the improved perfecting press used by the newspaper which for the forty-one years has been, and still is, the leading paper of the North Coast.

TROMLEY'S LATEST.

Judge McBride and District Attorney Allen were in town Tuesday to take up the petition signed by over 200 for the suspension of sentence of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Tromley on condition that they leave the county, but the discovery of a plan for jailbreak makes it likely they'll stay in the law's custody for some time. Sheriff Sewell discovered that Tromley had gotten a file and case knife with which he had manufactured two clever wooden keys that would open the jail locks and was working on the third for the outer door, at the same time preparing another exit by removing bricks from the rear wall.

Sheriff Sewell, E. B. Tongue and J. W. Morgan made strict search in and about the jail as a result and discovered \$200 in greenbacks in the toe of one of Burke's shoes. Tromley was to receive \$100 for his services. The officers are now investigating how money and tools got into the jail and strict guard is kept though a watch had been placed over a week ago who would have given more wounds to Mr. Burke had he gotten to the outside.

It is said the conviction of Mrs. Tromley of burning her dwelling is assured and that the evidence implicates Tromley.
