TO RECEIVE SUPREME MASTER ARTISAN.

Next Monday will be a big occasion with the Artisans of Washington county and among such of their friends as are fortunate enough to secure cards of admission to the open meeting of the Hillsboro Assembly held to welcome Hon. Isaac E. Staples, of Portland, the new Supreme Master Artisan. The head of the United Artisans is one of the best male singers on the Coast and famous as an entertainer, convulsing his audience with laughter at a comic song or moving them to tears with a pathetic ballad so complete is his mastery of the emotions of his hearers. In these entertainments he is ably assisted by Mrs. Staples, who will accompany him. He will also deliver a lecture on the Constitution and Bylaws and will be found a forceful and instructive speaker. The program begins at 7 o'clock in Old Fellows Hall with an informal reception with local music the first hour and at 8 o'clock the Supreme Master Artisan takes charge.

The United Artisans is an order of which Oregon may well be proud that it had its beginnings in the Webfoot metropolis. The 2nd of this month it passed its 9th anniversary and is today the wealthiest order per capita in America with a system that will not have to be changed in later years when its early members are too old to have any other opening for insurance, the injustice which too often has been meted out to the faithful first members of other orders.

With many members or few, there is the same security for every policyholder for the permanent funds can never be impaired, the entire running expense must be paid out of the initiation fees and the per capita tax, no other funds can be used for expense purposes. Thea each person who lapses out of the United Artisans leaves some money on interest for the benefit of those who remain faithful. Death and Time, the elements that produce weakness in other societies, to it bring strength.

Nor is it necessary to die to benefit by its policies, the holder is providing an income sufficient to make life easy in old age, for pensions are paid to members over seventy years old. Accident, too, is guarded against, for loss of eyesight brings half the amount of the certificate as does the loss of two limbs while one-fourth is paid for the loss of one. So a policy in the Artisans insures an estate of \$2000 for the benefit of loved ones, a competence in case of misfortune and an income for old age, all at a cost no greater than the taxes on \$2000 worth of property. Well may the Artisans assert that sound protection for the home cannot be obtained from any other reliable concern at so small a cost as in their order.

Absolute financial soundness, conservative business management and entire publicity for all their affairs, these are the boasts of the order. Every month each member receives a statement in detail of all the order's business and keeping these gives a complete copy of the head office's books. No large salaries are paid, the supreme secretary receives only \$1500 a year and the Supreme Master Artisan, \$900. Every officer is heavily bonded in a responsible surety company. With such safeguards the Artisans has grown to have a larger reserve fund, in proportion to its number of members, than any other order in America. This reserve is increasing as each Artisan that dies leaves a sufficient amount of money in the reserve fund to pay back to the order, in less than 20 years in interest, all that his beneficiaries draw out on account of his death.

Equally farsighted is the policy in

selecting members. Risks are not taken in the Southern States, or in unhealthy places as in large cities in the Northern States. The list of barred occupations is that of the most careful old line insurance companies, and as much care is taken to keep out unworthy applicants that the lodgeroom may be a harmonious home for members.

The United Artisans has over \$165,000 net assets, more than 8,000 beneficiaries in good standing and has paid over \$225,000 in death and disability benefits. The membership is open only to those who are physically, mentally and morally sound, it offers its advantages to white persons, male or female, between the ages of 18 and 50 years and just now a special opportunity is given in Hillsboro to join at greatly reduced cost. The monthly rates per \$1,000 of insurance, ranging from 45 cents at 18 years to \$1.25 at 51, are restricted to 12 in a year and are the lowest offered by any order while absolute safety is assured.

Hillsboro's local branch, Ruby Assembly, has 92 members and its weekly sessions, enlivened with music by the Assembly's orchestra, are fully of interest, so that the social feature is not the least of the attractions. Miss Rose Wilcox is Master Artisan and County School Superintendent H. A. Ball, secretary. The Assembly is being assisted this week by Mrs. Jennie McE. Galbreath, of Tualatin, assistant Grand Master, who comes of a pioneer family in Washington county and is so well and favorably known that her interest in the order would be an additional endorsement if further proof were needed.

DEATH OF MRS. HANNAHETTE BRUCE.

Mrs. Hannahette Bruce, the mother of Mrs. J. H. Ray who resides on Main St. east of Hillsboro, died Wednesday morning at 7:30 o'clock from the effect of a slight stroke of paralysis in June.

Mrs. Bruce was seventy-two years of age. She had no relatives on this coast except the daughter with whom she had made her home but five sons are living in the East. She had been a faithful member of the M. E. Church for over 40 years.

Funeral was Thursday afternoon from the M. E. church and burial in Old Fellows cemetery.

DEATH OF F. A. SHAW.

F. A. Shaw, aged 77 years, died at his home at Chebebe Sunday. He was born at Croubuzon, N. Y., and came to Corvallis, Ore., where he resided from 1863 to 1874, when he located in Washington County, and here had resided ever since. On May 1, 1853, at Red Oak Grove, Ill., he was married to Miss Martha Fuqua, who, with the following children, survives him: John C. Shaw, Potlach, Wash.; Mrs. Lorena Smith, Seattle; Charles Shaw and Mrs. Rhoda Rhodes, Forest Grove. Interment was in the Buxton cemetery, Tuesday.
