Governor Chamberlain's attempted interference with the legislature brings to mind the story told of a Tennessee legislature which tried to dictate how the executive department should be run. A delegation of legislators had called on the governor to warn him his free exercise of executive clemency must cease. His reply was to summon his pardon clerk and direct that pardons be prepared for every man in the penitentiary. Then turning to the committee he said: "Gentlemen, I am Governor of Tennessee and if this committee or any other ever again seeks to interfere with my constitutional right to pardon, I'll sign every one of those pardons which the clerk is making out." Oregon's legislative assembly seems to be preparing an avalanche of bill to rebuke our presumptuous chief magistrate. The Tennessee executive, by the way, will lecture at the Oregon City Chautauqua next Summer and is ex-Gov. Bob Taylor.

The Oregon Dairymen's Association, of which Wm. Schulmerich, of Farmington, is president, will hold its annual meeting at Corvallis, Dec. 15 and 16, under the auspices of the Benton Co. Business Men's League. Besides the annual address by the president Washington county will be represented on the program by papers from A. T. Buxton, of Forest Grove in "Winter vs Summer Dairying" and W. K. Newell, of Dilley, on "Dairying on a Fruit Farm." The director of the State Agricultural Experiment station Dr. Jas. Withycomb, is also down for an address on "The Economy of Soiling" and though Corvallis is his business address Washington County still claims him. A rate of one and a third fare for the round trip is made by the S. P. Co. on the certificate plan.

Another rural delivery mail route is likely soon to be established in the vicinity of Progress, largely through the efforts of I. L. Morelock of that place who by five days' work secured 141 names to the petition. Supplied from Beaverton, the proposed route is to Progress, thence four miles south-west to Tigardville then a mile toward Portland, turn northeast toward Progress, up the Scholls Ferry road to Raleigh, then north back to Beaverton. A route from Bertha already established supplies Garden Home. Of the five postoffices originally on the route from Portland to Scholls Ferry, three have already been discontinued.

At the Pan-American (Buffalo) exposition Washington county received five recognitions as follows: A gold medal was awarded F. A. Reuter, of Forest Grove, for Black Hamburg grapes in liquid; B. G. Loedy (master of the state grange), of Tigardville won a silver medal for Gravenstein apples; bronze were given L. Manning, of Hillsboro, for Golden prunes in liquid and F. A. Reuter, of Forest Grove, for Muscat and Burgundy wines, and W. K. Newell (horticultural commissioner) of Dilley, was honorably mentioned for Egg plums in liquid.

"Miss Minnie Bruger has returned from a pleasant visit to her aunt, Mrs. Moritz Schmidt, in Washington county" is the way the Sunday Oregonian chronicles the return of the contestant in the will case who succeeded in getting \$1,500 instead of \$50 out of the Bruger estate at the expense of putting on exhibition a family skeleton which had better been kept closeted.

Miss Lena Parker, of Gaston, appeared Thursday night, of last week, at Chehalis, Washington, as the second attraction in the Oregon lecture course and according to the press reports her reading made a most favorable impression.

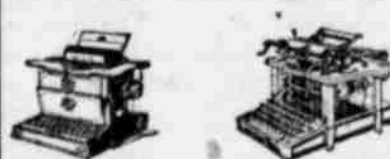
