Their bids were, 1500 tons at \$21.00, 1000 tons at \$22.80, 1500 tons at \$23.20 and 1435 tons at \$24.80. As Oregon bidders have several times failed to get contracts even when their bids were lowest the Portland Chamber of Commerce is interesting itself in their behalf and Senators Mitchell and Falton have been asked to see the Quartermaster.
