THE KENNEDY CASE.

A special session of the Circuit Court convened Wednesday morning with Hon. T. A. McBride on the bench, the session being an adjourned meeting to try the case of the State of Oregon vs. Rev. Richard H. Kennedy, the Congregational minister, charged with having burglarized the residence of E. H. Warren, residing one mile east of Hillsboro, on the early morning of September 1, 1903.

District Attorney Harrison Allen, of Astoria, is assisted by his local deputy, E. B. Tongue, while Hon. S. B. Huston is counsel for Kennedy, and is assisted by Judge Hewitt, of Albany. The case is exciting a great deal of interest and the trial is attended by several hundred people, of whom many are ladies. Every available seat in the courthouse was taken and scores stood all the after-

noon listening to the state's case.

JURY QUICKLY SECURED

There was but little trouble in the selection of a jury, and but one man was rejected from the 13 who were called in to the jury-box. The jury is considered one of the best ever impaneled here on a criminal case and is made up as follows:

H. L. Russell, Gaston; James Churchill and M. H. Parkin, Gales Creek; George Pasley, North Hillsboro; Henry Gilmore, Tigardville; I. L. Morelock, Progress; John Ireland, Greenville; W. B. Cate, East Hillsboro; J. C. Schulmerich, Banks; Arthur Bacon, Mountaineale; Thomas Mathiesen, Middleton, and W. H. Stratton, Cornelius.

COUNSEL OUTLINE CASES

Deputy E. B. Tongue made the opening statement, and said that the state proposed to prove the defendant entered the house of Mr. Warren on the night mentioned and that he was recognized by Miss Minnie Warren and by Mrs. B. F. Mackinder, of St. Helena, Cal., who was a guest of the house and who lost her purse, her watch and a ring. He stated that he would prove that Kennedy had hired a wheel in Portland the night before the robbery and had not returned it before the next morning.

Mr. Huston, in reply, stated that he would prove that Kennedy had hired the wheel to go to St. Johns to write accident insurance, and that he had been seen near St. Johns as late as 8:30 that evening; that he had occupied a room in the Multnomah block, opposite the old Postoffice site in Portland; and that the woman in charge had seen a light in Kennedy's room between the hours of 11 and 12, only a few hours before the robbery was committed, nearly 20 miles away; and that he would prove that another man saw the wheel in front of the lodging-house as early as a little after 6 on the morning of the robbery.

The testimony in the Kennedy case is looked on as strong by those who believe him guilty and unconvincing by the upholders of his innocence. Only a copy of the court reporter's minutes would fairly tell the witnesses' testimony, any summary is necessarily an emphasis of the writer's grounds for his belief. The jury by next issue will have given their opinion, which is the only one of real value, and it is a safe prediction that it will be either acquittal or disagreement. No dozen men on the street are agreed in the matter; now the state's testimony is all in and it is not likely the 12 men in the jury box will be any different.

HISTORY OF THE KENNEDY CASE

At 2 o'clock on the morning of September 1, 1903, the dwelling of E. M. Warren, just outside the city limits of Hillsboro, was entered. The masked burglar went into the room occupied by Mrs. Mackinder, a visitor from St. Helena, Cal., and wife of an editor who is also postmaster there. Mrs. Mackinder's screams brought Miss Warren to the room. She ran to get her father. The aged Mr. Warren was already on the way, aroused by the unusual noise overhead. At the point of a revolver Mr. Warren was compelled to enter another apartment, where he was confined. The woman escaped from a second-story window, sliding down a post to the porch. Mrs. Mackinder was relieved of a valuable watch, costly ring and \$7.50 in cash.

On the afternoon of September 2, 1903, Rev. R. H. Kennedy, of Hillsboro, formerly Congregational minister, was arrested on the charge of burglarizing the Warren residence, and placed in jail in default of bonds.

September 5, 1903, Mr. Kennedy was released on \$1000 bonds, subscribed by citizens of Forest Grove, with one exception.

At the November term of Circuit Court Mr. Kennedy pleaded not guilty and the case was continued till January 13th to take depositions of Eastern witnesses.
