Forest Grove's city election Monday resulted in the entire success of the Anti Saloon ticket, save that they had no candidate for marshal and endorsed the city nominee for treasurer. The total vote was 316, against 245 last year. Mayor—David Smith, city, 125; Walter Hoge, anti-saloon, 175. Councilmen—B. H. Laughlin, city, 149; W. A. Billinger, city, 122; A. J. Wirtz, city, 113; S. B. Starrett, anti-saloon, 178; W. R. Harris, anti-saloon, 184; L. L. Hollinger, anti-saloon, 164. Recorder—J. C. Clark, city, 134; L. C. Walker, anti-saloon, 169. Treasurer—W. S. Hudson, city, anti-saloon, 285. Marshal—P. W. Corwin, city, 243. For cows running at large—Cows running at large, Yes, 76; cows running at large, No, 213.

According to the usual ratio the city election shows Forest Grove to have a population of 1580. Hillsboro by its recent vote would have 1470.

The Hillsboro milk condenser's new machinery now being installed will increase the capacity to 125,000 lbs. with the plant already in operation.

Forest Grove school tax will be 7 mills, city 10 mills, state 27 1/2 mills or a total of 44 1/2 mills. While newcomers this may appear high it should be remembered that property is assessed at only a fraction of its real value.
