James H. Sewell, who won a gold medal for his hops at the Buffalo Exposition, has sent an exhibit to St. Louis, calculated to bring back another trophy. A chest, 3x2x2, of Oregon ash, made by L. W. House and beautifully finished, contains, under glass, section showing the various "grains" of the pressed hops while a couple of sacks give samples for those who care to examine the hops closer. In the lid are 16 cubes cut from as many bales in the way the English sample hops, for Mr. Sewell's market is Liverpool, and there "Hillsboro hops," under which name he sells his hops, as well as exhibits them, have come to be known as standard in their excellence. Besides the 360 bales from his own two yards, he ships hops bought from other growers of the Valley, all of which are as carefully selected that the reputation of the brand may be maintained.
