The Southern Pacific has decided to open up a gravel pit near Independence, put in a steam shovel and gravel the Yamhill and West Side divisions, the hauling from Canby which was done for the work between Beaverton and Reedville having proven too expensive. The work so far has made the ride to Portland rougher, as the surfacing cannot be done till dry weather comes.

Judge Rood has decided for the second time that Forest Grove's prohibitory ordinance is invalid and A. G. Watson, of the "Iron House" was Monday, for the second time, freed from custody by habeas corpus proceedings. The first time the City of Forest Grove lost by failing to answer; this time the issue came up on its merits and after Attorneys Huston, Welch and Hoffman, for the city, and Mendenhall and E. B. Tongue,

for Watson, had read law and argued, the court made its decision against the municipality. A third case still pending will probably be decided the same way. Meantime the city has appealed and Judge McBride will hear the matter, with a possibility that it will go to the Supreme Court.

The Hillsboro condenser has been trying its new plant for the past four or five days, and after a month's test, if satisfactory, will begin running full capacity, as the market demand will consume as much Oregon Grape evaporated cream as they can supply, even with the greatly increased output.

Ex-Clerk J. A. Imbrie, in charge of registration for County Clerk G. A. Morgan, up to the evening of March 13 had 1529 names of voters who are qualified to vote next June. The balance of the 4000 voters of the county have two months more in which to get themselves registered.

Postmaster Waggener has been enjoying a busy season paying money orders which were sent to the sheriff, the government's blue papers being a favorite means of sending in taxes. Over \$6000 came through the post-office, about \$5400 more than was on hand in the usual course of business. Some \$3200 of this has since come in, and as soon as it is exactly determined what amount further will be needed, not all the orders having yet been presented, the postmaster will telegraph for funds, which will be time, the Hillsboro office is at least relieved of the bother of making remittances of its surplus funds. Not all, however, of the taxpayers used money orders, but checks, drafts, bank and express orders came in, while the Southern Pacific Company made one remittance of a sack of \$444.44 in coin.
