Nominated by Acclamation.

Harris Drops Out. Williamson Nominated in the Second District.

FROM THE CAPITAL CITY

SALEM, Or., April 12.—The delegates to the Republican Congressional Convention, First District, met this morning in the opera house. The interest manifested yesterday by the few delegates on the ground was not apparent, due to the rumor which had gained general circulation that Hon. L. T. Harris, one of the aspirants for the nomination, had declined and would second Binger Hermann's re-nomination.

The convention was called to order by Secretary Winn in the absence of Chairman Harris. Senator Kelly, of Linn, nominated Gale S. Hill, of the same county, for secretary. He was chosen without division.

The committee on organization and order of business reported to the convention.

That the temporary organization be made permanent.

Second that two delegates to the National Republican Convention be elected.

Third, that two alternates be chosen.

Fourth, that a congressman for the First District be nominated.

Fifth, that the county's delegations report the County Central Committee.

The report was adopted. The committee on credentials not being ready to report, the committee report on resolutions reported as follows:

The Republicans of the First Oregon Congressional District in convention assembled here unanimously endorse the administration of our national government at the hands of President Roosevelt and most heartily recommend his nomination for president.

We demand a continuance of those financial and industrial policies which through the instrumentality of the Republican party have been productive of the greatest prosperity at home and the greatest commercial expansion abroad.

We extend our most cordial greetings to the Oregon delegation in the National Congress and Senate and compliment them on the successful labors they have performed for the promotion of every essential interest of this commonwealth.

The people of Oregon without party distinction, demand the earliest possible completion of the inter-oceanic canal undertaken with such great determination and brilliant prospects of success by a Republican administration.

The resolutions were adopted without debate. While waiting for the National Committee, Ex-governor Geer made a short speech followed by Governor Lord, Edley and Speaker Harris.

Chairman Brownell, in a neat speech, paid a glowing tribute to Speaker L. T. Harris who so generously had spoken for the success of the ticket. He was cheered to the echo, not so much on account of what he said as in recognition of Harris.

No further business appearing, the convention adjourned without day.
