The occasion was the conferring of the Third Rank on three candidates of the Cornelius Castle, the work being done by a team from Delphi Lodge No. 39, Forest Grove. After the ceremony a banquet was given, to which between forty and fifty of the Cornelius lodge and visiting brethren did full justice, and a very happy social time is reported. The rain, which set in early in the evening, prevented a much larger attendance from Phoenix Lodge.

Geo. M. Orton, manager of the Multnomah Printing Co., of Portland, was in town last Sunday visiting friends and looking over the field with a view to organizing a lodge of the Imperial Order of Red Men. Mr. Orton is the Grand Sachem of the Great Council of this state, and takes a deep interest in the organization, and stated to us that the prospects for a lodge in Hillsboro are very good. At the meeting of the Portland Presbytery held on Wednesday, Rev. A. Robinson of the Tualatin Plains Presbyterian church and Chaplain Gilbert of the Calvary Presbyterian church, Portland, were elected as commissioners to attend the Presbyterian General Assembly, to be held in Buffalo, N. Y., next month. Mr. Robinson has been in this state for over seventeen years, and as both he and Mrs. Robinson have friends and relatives residing in the East, the opportunity thus offered of visiting them will be availed of. Mr. and Mrs. Robinson will leave Hillsboro for the East about May 1 and will return about the end of the month.

Last Friday Jessie J. Stout, a fisherman, was brought into Judge Bagley's court, charged with assault upon one August Hellebyck. Stout had been fishing in the river which meanders through the plaintiff's farm and using more or less of Mr. Hellebyck's wood for fuel to take off the dampness caused by the gentle "Oregon mist" which has been prevailing for several moons. Now, the question of wood and the price attached to it is no joke, and Hellebyck went to Stout and made a vigorous protest against the free use of his property. For reply Stout gave the plaintiff several good healthy blows over the face and disfigured his beauty to such an extent that Justice Bagley decided that it was worth \$10 of any man's money to do the job up so artistically. So Stout paid up without a murmur and passed out into the glad sunlight.

It may be of interest to some who have added "just a few words" of writing in their package of papers or merchandise to know that the abuse has become so common that postmasters have been instructed to examine packages and reports. If writing is found by the department officials, the next the sender knows will be a visit from a United States marshal with a warrant for his arrest. He will be taken to the federal court for trial with the result, if convicted, of having to pay a fine of \$25 and the costs of the action, all of which has a tendency to impress upon the victim the fact that it would have been a great deal cheaper to have sent those "few words" in an envelope with a 2-cent stamp on the corner.

A report had gained circulation that John Oliver, 76 years old, who was found dead in the river near his home in Timber, near Buxton, some ten days ago, and who was buried soon after, had

met with foul play. To settle any doubt in regard to the matter, County Coroner Large was informed by people living in the vicinity of Timber, of their suspicions and accompanied by Sheriff J. W. Sewell, Deputy Prosecuting Attorney E. B. Tongue and Dr. W. P. Via, went to the place of burial on Tuesday and exhumed the body. A searching investigation proved the report without foundation. In support of the statement made by the dead man's neighbors, it was claimed that when the body was being prepared for burial a deep and long gash had been found on the man's head. This they did not believe the result of the man having struck some hard object in the fall, but thought it had been inflicted with a blow from some sharp instrument. Oliver had lived in the neighborhood of Timber for about 14 years. It was near his home that his body was found in the river, and the supposition was that while at work on the bank he had lost his footing and fallen to his death.

Clean Journalism.
In Monday's Statesman, Ex-Governor Geer said: "Speaking of clean journalism, what an ideal paper would be the product of a partnership between Mr. Bath, of the Hillsboro Independent, and Mr. Wash, of the Polk County Itemizer." If commending everything bad and upholding all that is good be clean journalism, we plead guilty.—Polk County Itemizer.

Mail Blockade Raised.
The through trains on the O. R. & N. railroad, which has been stalled between Baker City and Huntington since last Friday morning, resumed operations Tuesday and mails which had been accumulating in large quantities, was released. High water and the going out of the railroad bridge caused the delay. A temporary bridge has been built across the river, over which trains will pass until the new structure is completed. The work of rebuilding is being pushed by a large force of men. The mail at the Hillsboro postoffice was very light for two or three days, but Postmaster Waggener and his force are handling the usual amount again.

Tribute to a Good Man.
The Sunday Oregonian says of Frank C. Baker, the recently appointed chairman of the Republican State Central Committee, and the commitment is a deserved one: "That Mr. Frank C. Baker, during his absence on a sick bed, was selected as chairman of the Republican State Central Committee is not only a tribute to his qualifications and efficiency, but an unusual testimonial of confidence on the part of the committee members. Hints on Road Work.
The question of good roads in this vicinity, as well as all over the state, is become a serious matter, and it is hard to decide what is the best thing to do. In some localities rock may be the best, but in this part of the country where rock is scarce and has to be hauled so far, I think it is better to resort to something else. With my experience in road work and my observations, I am satisfied that ditching and grading up is the best. The work should be done so that the water can run from the center of the road to the ditches, and the latter should be wide enough to make plenty of room for travel. The timber should be down far enough to permit the sun to shine on the roads. Many of the roads are in very bad condition this spring, but I can show some that has stood the travel, but they were drained and had good work put on them early in the season. Early work pays, and the grader should be used several times during the summer so as to keep the road as level as possible, and once after the fall rains come on.

Died.
Mr. Talbot Miller, of Scoggins Valley, died at his home on Monday, April 18, after a somewhat prolonged illness. Deceased leaves a widow and one little daughter and an aged mother to mourn his loss. The funeral service, which was held at Gaston, was conducted by Rev. A. Robinson, of Hillsboro. The Woodmen, of which order deceased was a member, held a service at grave side.

A Bad Accident.
Last Tuesday Calvin Johnson, whose father is connected with the Johnson Bros. sawmill at South Tualatin, four or five miles south of this city, met with a bad accident which will lay him up for some time. He was slipping a belt on a pulley when his thumb was caught and torn from the hand and his left arm broken in two places, the bones protruding through the flesh. Dr. Linklater was summoned and went out and dressed the injuries. A message received last evening says that the young man is doing nicely.

Court Notes.

Judge McBride finished up the circuit court business for the term, last Friday. Objections to cost bill in the case of John Wool vs. C. M. and Florence Hawthorne were argued and decided. The cost bill was allowed to stand with some slight modifications.

The second habeas corpus case from Forest Grove was decided in favor of the city. The case of Robinson vs. Parker et al. was decided in favor of defendants. This was a suit to foreclose a mechanic's lien upon a sawmill structure located out back of Glencoe. Parties who helped to get out materials for the building filed a lien thereon for their pay. The suit was decided adversely to the plaintiffs upon the ground that a portion of the material was shown to have been used in construction of the mill dam.

The judge will return on April 29, at which time the appeal papers in the James Lee case will probably be ready for approval.
