RATHBONE SISTERS

Held First Convention in the Second District—An Enjoyable and Instructive Meeting.

The first convention of Rathbone Sisters of District No. 2, composed of Hillsboro, Portland, McMinnville, Forest Grove and Tillamook Temples, was held in this city last Wednesday, and was well attended by representatives of each Temple, excepting Tillamook, which failed to send a representative. On March 4th the first district convention to be held in Oregon was convened at Pendleton.

The object of these meetings is to aid the Grand Temple in its work of instructions, in this way reaching members who are unable to attend the Grand Temple sessions, and the convention just closed demonstrated the fact that great benefit is derived by every Temple sending representatives.

Many features are explained by the Grand officers, and the exemplification of the degree work, which is conducted by a selected staff and officers best qualified to perform their duties, was indeed an excellent illustration, and all members are better qualified, as a result and more capable to exemplify the initiatory work. The morning session brought delegates to the number of about fifty, who were met at the depot by the reception committee and conducted to K. P. hall, where the morning session convened at 10 o'clock.

The hall was very attractively decorated with cedar boughs, Oregon grape, cut flowers, beautiful silk American flags and white, blue, yellow and red ribbons, colors of the order.

The address of welcome, which was delivered by Past Chief Mrs. Lou H. Barrett, of Phenocia, Temple of Hillsboro, to the visiting members, was received with pleasure. Mrs. Barrett said:

"In the absence, and at the request of the most excellent Chief of Phenocia Temple, No. 10, upon the devoted duty, as well as the pleasure of extending to all non-resident Sisters, a hearty and cordial welcome to Hillsboro.

I assure you that Phenocia Temple, No. 10, is highly gratified in having this privilege, of having the first District Convention held at Hillsboro, and that all members of this temple will unite in making this meeting a pleasant, as well as a profitable one for our order.

The Order of Knights of Pythias was organized at Washington, D. C. in 1841. It is one of the great fraternal organizations of the world. Its central thought is to teach friendship and fraternity among its members.

The Order of Knights of Pythias, in its work, not only care for their members, but in its scope, it extends to the wives, daughters, widows and sisters of the Knights of Pythias.
