SUBSIDY WILL SECURE THE ROAD.

The following is taken from the Portland Telegram and refers to the much-talked-of and greatly-wished-for electric line between Portland and this city:

Whether or not the Oregon Traction company will build an electric line connecting Portland with Hillsboro and Forest Grove depends upon the alacrity with which the people of the two Washington county towns and vicinity comply with the pledge of their committees for a subsidy of \$100,000. President A. Graydon, of the company, has returned after an absence of two months, much of which was spent in New York city completing negotiations that have been in progress for many months, financing the proposition. Just before Mr. Graydon left for the East citizens of the two towns made the pledge of a subsidy, and the Oregon Traction company was formed to take over the franchise granted by the Portland council to the West Side and Suburban company for a line out Northrup street to the city limits. A delegation of representative citizens appeared before the members of the council to request that the franchise be not revoked pending completion of negotiations for financing the enterprise, and the council decided to defer action until June 1. After that date the question of revoking the franchise may be again brought up unless some decisive action is taken by the company to protect its privilege.

"The entire line to Hillsboro and Forest Grove can be built," said Mr. Graydon, "and put in operation in six months, I believe, and for that reason we are desirous of getting to work as soon as possible. I do not know the exact status of the bonds matter, but will immediately take it up with the committee. It will probably be impossible to commence active work before the close of the present month, but I can see no reason why it should not be under way within a few days after the first of June."

The Newburg News strikes a note which should concern every town in Oregon, when it says that "Some day the citizens of Newburg will bitterly arraign us pioneers for being so careless and short-sighted as not to have laid out a city park. If ten years ago just one block had been set apart somewhere in town and artistically set with maple trees, it would have been a great boon to the town by this time. Property is steadily advancing in price and the longer the project is delayed, the more expensive it will be."

Reception to H. Lenox.

Yesterday was a day which will long be remembered in the annals of Hillsboro, particularly by the pioneer residents of Washington county. The occasion was a reception given by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wehrung to Edward H. Lenox, a pioneer of 1843, who was a member of the memorable immigration of that year, which was the first to bring wagons through to the Willamette valley. Mr. Lenox's father, David T. Lenox, settled about seven miles north of Hillsboro, and in his log house was organized the first Baptist church west of the Rocky mountains, on May 25, 1843, the sixtieth anniversary of which Mr. Lenox came to attend from Oakland, Cal., of which city he has been a resident since 1859. Mrs. White, a sister, also a pioneer of 1843, came from Eastern Oregon to attend this meeting. It was a happy thought on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Wehrung to take advantage of this opportunity to call together a number of the former neighbors of Mr. Lenox, who spent several hours in renewing old acquaintanceship and enjoying a sumptuous dinner served by Mrs. Wehrung, her daughters and grand daughters.
