

Abner McKinley Dead.

Summers, Pa., June 11.—Abner McKinley, brother of the late President, was found dead in a chair at his home, at 8 o'clock this morning. His death came without warning to his family. His colored servant, who slept in his room, was up at 2 o'clock, and it is not known at what time Mr. McKinley got up again, as he did not waken his servant. Mrs. McKinley walked into his room at 8 o'clock and found him sitting in a chair, cold and apparently dead. A physician was summoned, who said death probably occurred two hours before.

Mr. McKinley's death was due to Bright's disease, which developed shortly after the death of his distinguished brother, three years ago. Since then Mr. McKinley has devoted nearly all his time in a vain attempt to overcome the fatal malady, consulting the most eminent physicians, and traveling from one climate to another. Two weeks ago he had returned from Tampa, Fla., where he had been for six weeks.

The sufferer was not confined to bed, and the evening before his death took a drive into the country, accompanied by his wife.

The Oregon Grapes.

A thousand sprigs of Oregon grape, tied with white ribbons, were sent from here this morning by members of the local W. C. T. U. to be distributed at the St. Louis fair on Oregon day, June 15th, each token being sent from all over the state. The idea is a splendid one for which the ladies are to be highly complimented. Harrisburg, Pa., June 10.—Governor Pennypacker today appointed Philip G. Knox successor to the late senator Quay. Governor Pennypacker also announced that he will not call the Legislature in extra session. This means that the appointment of Mr. Knox is for the unexpired term ending March 4, 1905.

The Crops.

The week has been dry and too cool for rapid growth. Except in the coast counties and a few localities in the Willamette valley, rain is badly needed for late crops. Fall wheat and barley are heading nicely and promise good yields. Early sown wheat, barley and oats are also doing fairly well but the grain of all kinds is making slow growth, and without timely rains will give unusually light returns. The nights have been too cool for corn. Frosts occurred on several mornings, but they did no harm except east of the Cascades, it is reported that tender vegetables were killed in a few localities.

Haying is well started and the first crop of alfalfa has generally been secured, with yields above the average; but meadow hay is not so promising, and a short crop is indicated nearly everywhere in the Willamette valley and southern Oregon. Pasture continues good on the ranges. Stock is in fine condition, and the flow of milk in the dairy districts is excellent.

Hops, potatoes, field onions, sugar beets and gardens are growing slowly, and, although in need of rain, have not yet suffered seriously for lack of moisture.

Strawberries and cherries are ripe and of excellent quality. Apples are doing well, but pears, prunes and peaches are uneven, in some localities being good and in others almost a failure.

Angora Goats.

The breeder of pure Angora goats must give close attention to his flocks the year round. A doe will often leave a newborn kid to join her flock as soon as it gets out of her sight, nor will she return to her kid unless the flock happens to feed that way. Naturally many kids are lost and others would die if they were not taken care of. A few head of well bred goats may be found profitable on any farm, especially on a farm where brush killing is an improvement, as no other animal will destroy shrubs so quickly.—Country Life in America.

They unite in declaring that Japan will fight to the last drop of blood and spend her last ounce of silver before appealing for the assistance and mediation of other nations.

The first day's subscription for the second domestic loan aggregated \$9,800,000 yen (\$43,000,000) in Tokyo, Osaka and Yokohama alone. The Emperor has again subscribed 20,000,000 yen from his own private fortune to the fund.
