Meeting of the County Board.

Hillsboro, July 6, 1904. County Board met in regular session this 6th day of July.

Ordered that the petition to establish a drainage district be approved and the petition be recorded by the county clerk in Commissioners' Journal.

The report of viewers read first time at June meeting, read second time. No remonstrance being filed or claim for damages, it is ordered that report be adopted and road established, 40 feet in width as per report, plat and survey. Clerk will issue orders to open and draw warrants in favor of viewers at \$4 per day; no mileage.

E. J. Goldman's bond as county clerk in United States Fidelity and Guarantee Co. as surety, approved.

Bond of A. A. Morrill, county surveyor, approved. J. A. Imbrie and B. P. Cornelius, sureties.

Bond of M. C. Case, Supt. of schools, approved. Josephine Case, Wm. T. Shearer, E. A. Heyde and L. E. Smith, sureties.

Petition for county road, presented by Frederick Hanson et al. Ordered that the petition be recorded. R. B. Collins and Loui Manning appointed viewers and A. A. Morrill or his deputy, surveyor, or surveyor to meet at the house of Frederick Hanson, on July 12, at 10 o'clock a. m., to view said road and assess damages.
