ONIONS FOR A COLD.

SPICED COOKIES.
One cup sugar, 1 tablespoon cinnamon, 1 cup molasses, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 cup lard 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 grated nutmeg. Boil above together then let cool and add 3 eggs, 1/2 cup water and table-spoon soda, bake in sheet, when cool put boiled frosting over, and cut in squares, or roll out and bake as other cookies.
