HOME-MADE BONBONS.
If one is willing to devote a little time and patience to the work, a great variety of most delicious bonbons may be made at less than half the price ordinarily charged by the confectioner. Recipes have been often given for various cream candies compounded of confectioner's sugar worked to a paste with water and the white of an egg. The chief, if not the only merit, which these possess, is that they are quickly prepared. They are so greatly inferior to the boiled cream confections in every way. Granulated sugar may be recommended for all creams as being more reliable than powdered or confectioner's sugar. Excellent results are produced with the pulverized sugar oftentimes, but it is not so uniformly pure. If one chances to fail in the first experiment with the foundation cream, it is a simple matter to add more water and repeat the process, and the cream will not suffer because of the second boiling.

FOUNDATION CREAM.
To a pint of granulated sugar allow a scant half-pint of water. Place them on the back of the range in a granite kettle or bright tin basin, until the sugar is nearly dissolved, shaking the kettle occasionally to assist the process, but never stirring. Bring forward and boil, skimming off whatever impurities rise to the surface without disturbing the syrup. When it has boiled ten minutes, test the syrup by allowing it to run slowly off the end of a spoon. It will soon drip in elongated drops, and finally a long fine thread will float from the end of the spoon. As soon as this appears, remove from the fire and set in a pan of ice-water, and allow it to partially cool. While still blood warm begin to work it with a stout spoon. Should the syrup be boiled to long a crust will have formed on the top, which may be removed before stirring. When cooled exactly right the surface is covered with a thin skin. When the syrup thickens and whitens, add a pinch of cream of tartar. Beat again until thick enough to handle, then work with the hands. Add any flavoring desired. This foundation cream is the base of almost all fine, rich bonbons. Its excellence depends upon several conditions. First, the sugar should be pure; it should be allowed to dissolve gradually; it should not be stirred at all while on the stove; it must be cooked to exactly the right consistency; it should be partially cooled before being worked, and then worked vigorously and well. A little experience enables one to tell just the instant the syrup should be removed from the fire, and the rest of the work presents no obstacles. It cooked too long the cream will "grain" and becomes dry and hard, while with too little cooking one will not be able to mould it.

WALNUT CREAMS.
Flavor the cream very delicately with rose water, form into balls, and press half of a fine English walnut in each. Hickory nuts are equally good, though the balls should be made smaller for these.

COCONUT BALLS.
Flavor a portion of the foundation cream with vanilla and work in a little desiccated coconut. Form into small balls and set in a cold place for a little time. Moisten each slightly with beaten white of egg—a brush is excellent for this purpose—then roll in grated coconut and set in a cold place till firm.

ALMOND CREAMS.
Flavor the cream with almond extract and form into loaf-shaped candies. Press an almond into the center of each and roll in coarse sugar or in chopped almonds, as preferred. It is customary to use the almonds without blanching, as the flavor is finer.

CHOCOLATE COCONUTS.
Chocolate cocoanuts, which are especially fine, are made very much like the creams, save that a little desiccated coconut is worked into the cream, which is moulded into oblong shapes, then rolled in chocolate. Other chocolates contain walnut meats, almonds or filberts.

RIBBON STRIPS.
Ribbon strips are very pretty. Divide the cream into three equal parts. Add a little dissolved chocolate to one, the pink coloring to another, and flavor the third portion with vanilla. Make them into three layers, press together, and when firm cut in small strips.

CHOCOLATE CREAMS.
Vanilla or lemon is best for flavoring the cream. Make into small balls, and set aside on a buttered plate until firm. Break up some Baker's chocolate and set the basin containing it in boiling water until the chocolate is dissolved. Add a tiny bit of butter or melted suet

to thin it a little. Drop the cream balls, one at a time, in the chocolate till all are coated, then set away to harden. In coating the creams, long slender sticks will be found very helpful. Hardwood tooth-picks will answer nicely.

CHOCOLATE CARAMELS.
One pint of brown sugar, one gill of sweet milk, one-half pint of molasses, one-half cake of baker's chocolate, grated, and a good teaspoonful of butter. Boil over a slow fire, stirring the ingredients and occasionally afterward, as it burns easily. Test it by dropping a little into cold water. If it hardens quickly remove at once from the fire, flavor with vanilla, and pour into buttered tins. One should be careful in adding the extract, as the heat is likely to set fire to the alcohol, especially if added while on the stove. When cool, mark the caramels in squares with a buttered knife.

MOLASSES CANDY.
Butter the inside of a deep sauce-pan and put in a quart of New Orleans molasses—the saucepan must be deep enough to prevent the molasses boiling over. Boiling for half an hour, lifting the pan quickly from the fire for a minute if it comes to the top. At the end of half an hour add half a teaspoonful of baking soda; continue to boil until it is brittle and will snap between the teeth when tried in cold water. Add table-spoonful of vinegar or lemon juice and pour out in a thin layer into oiled tins. When cool enough to handle this may be pulled to a light yellow if desired.

CREAM TO ORDER.
A cooking teacher tells of manufactured cream that is worth knowing about in emergencies, when the real article is not to be had. It is made from the whites of two eggs, beaten stiff, with a table-spoonful of sugar and a teaspoonful of cornstarch. Half a cup of cold milk is heated over the fire, with a small butter ball melted in it. This is allowed to come just to the boiling point, when it is removed to a cooler part of the stove, and the beaten egg mixture added. When it has all thickened very slightly, to about the consistency of thick cream, it is taken off and strained and cooled. This may be used as cream for serving with fresh or preserved fruits, but it is needless to add it will not whip.
