Gasoline Cars to Hillsboro.
Rapid transit connection between Forest Grove, Hillsboro and intermediate points and Portland is assured.
Only the means lacking, and at the present time the Harriman interests are putting forth every effort to ascertain the best motive power for this service. There was some talk a short time ago of stringing trolley wires over the Southern Pacific tracks between this city and Forest Grove, an running an hourly car, by means of electricity. This has now been abandoned and gasoline cars are being constructed in the Kansas City shops, which, if successful, will be employed on this run.

If these cars are not all that is desired steam or some other motive power will be used. Cars every two hours are planned.
General Manager E. E. Calvin, at the head of the Harriman lines in the Northwest, said today:

"It will be a matter of another month before the gasoline cars will be completed. They will then be tried and if successful will be sent out here."

Hillsboro and Forest Grove commercial interests have been assured by Southern Pacific officials that their desire for closer connection with the metropolis will be granted. Though the proposed service is expected to sound the deathknell of the oft-talked-of electric line to parallel the Southern Pacific road, it is doubtless intended for that purpose by the railroad interests—the people who have long complained of their isolation and the difficulty of getting to and from the city and will welcome its institution. They declare the electric power has too long hung fire and they hail with delight the prospect of relief.

Two gasoline cars are being constructed for use in the Northwest. This is admitted. Mr. Calvin would not say that both were to be employed between Portland and Forest Grove, leaving it to be supposed that some other service is also to be arranged for.—Portland Telegram.

Dr. Tamsie is very enthusiastic, and ask what farmers watch the results on his farm, if they do not believe in these special germs, or do not wish to ask the U. S. Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C., for rux trial packages of germs, enough to inoculate one or two acres.

The ground should be prepared like a garden and the alfalfa sown alone and, best, in the fall, so as to insure that the roots will pass through the lower soil while it is yet moist and soft, especially as the true horse in the clay soil of most parts of the valley, where we do not, nor need not irrigate. Just imagine this great sea of nitrogen, for which the plant, alfalfa, hungers, transformed into forage.
