Mr. Mitchell Speaks.

Washington, Jan. 17.—While the routine business of the morning hour was in progress in the Senate today, Mitchell of Oregon entered the chamber. It was his first appearance in the Senate since the indictment against him by a grand jury of his own state, and his entrance created evident interest.

Mr. Mitchell took his customary seat in the rear of the chamber and was immediately surrounded by other Senators, who shook his hand warmly and gave him assurance of confidence in his innocence. The welcome was so hearty and so general that the Senator was nearly overcome, so that when, a few moments later, he rose to speak, his voice was for a time almost inaudible and it was difficult for him to proceed on account of emotion.

Mitchell read his statement from manuscript. As he proceeded his voice cleared and there was little difficulty in hearing him throughout the chamber. He had the undivided attention of Senators and visitors throughout his recital. The Senators, almost to a man, faced about when Mitchell began to speak, and few of them changed positions until he closed. The scene was impressive.

At the outset, the Senator declared that the charges made against him, if true, unfitted him to occupy his seat in the Senate. He then detailed the charges and said:

"I assert in the most positive and unqualified manner that each and every one of these charges, insofar as they relate to or involve me, are absolutely, unqualifiedly and atrociously false, and I here and now indignantly and defiantly denounce their authors, and each and everyone of them, and brand them publicly as malicious and atrocious liars."

Following this general denial with one more specific, the Senator spoke as follows:

"But I desire to be more specific and therefore I further deny, in terms the most absolute and unqualified which I am capable of using, that I ever, either in the month of January, 1902, in the State of Oregon or at any other time or place, unlawfully or feloniously, or otherwise conspire with Binger Hermann, then Commissioner of the Land Office, and S. A. D. Pater, Horace G. McKinley, D. W. Tuttle, Emma L. Watson, Samuel B. Ormsby, Clark E. Loomis and William H. Davis, or with either or any of them, or with any person or persons, to defraud the United States out of any part of its public lands located either in township 11 south, range 7 east, in the State of Oregon, or any other public lands either in the State of Oregon or elsewhere."

"I assert, furthermore, in the most absolute and unqualified manner, that any and all statements by any person or persons to the effect that I ever at any time or place entered into a conspiracy with all or any of said persons, or they or any of them, with me, to defraud the United States out of any part of its public lands in the State of Oregon or elsewhere, either by false or forged home-stead applications, affidavits or proofs are absolutely, unqualifiedly and atrociously false, and I defy my defamers and challenge them to produce any evidence other than that of condemned thieves, forgers and perjurers to sustain any such charges."

"I further deny in the most absolute and unqualified terms that S. A. D. Pater, did either in the City of Washington on March 9, 1902, or at any other time or place, offer me or pay to me, or give, nor did I on March 9, 1902, in Washington, D. C., or at any other time or place, accept or receive from said S. A. D. Pater, the sum of \$200.00 or any other amount whatever, either in two \$100 bills or any other denomination or amount whatever as an inducement to use my influence with Binger Hermann, then Commissioner of the General Land Office, to induce him, as such Commissioner, to pass to patent 12 certain homestead entries, or any homestead entries whatever of for any other purpose."

"And I here indignantly, with all the force I can command, denounce the public statement of S. A. D. Pater that he, on March 9, 1902, at Washington, D. C., paid me \$200 in two \$100 bills, as willfully, maliciously, unqualifiedly and atrociously false."

The Senator then said he thought it proper he should state precisely what connections he ever had with Pater and the lands in question and some of the circumstances connected with the actions of the grand jury and the publication in the press regarding the charges. He said that about March 1 or 2, 1902, Pater called on him in Washington with a letter of introduction from Hon. F. P. Mays, a prominent attorney of Portland, Oregon, and for many years the District Attorney for the Oregon District. Pater had with him a woman, whom he introduced as Mrs. E. L. Watson, a widow and a citizen of Oregon, who had invested something over \$800 in 12 homesteads after the entryman had received their certificates. The woman had obtained the greater part of this money by mortgaging other lands, secured by notes coming due. She could not raise the money to meet these notes until she had received patents for the 12 homesteads she had purchased.

Pater had acted as agent for the woman, and she was blaming him, Pater said, as he had assured her when she made the purchases that the patents to the lands would be issued in the regular course of business, certainly before the notes she had given for the borrowed money became due. Pater said it would be several months before the cases would be reached in the regular order in the Land Office, and that his purpose in calling on him (the Senator) was to know if he could aid him in getting them advanced for early consideration. The Senator said he told Pater certainly he would help him in the event he found the cases in a condition to be taken up. Pater, the Senator said, replied that he thought the cases had been thoroughly investigated by agents in the field and reported on favorably.

"I had not, of course, the slightest suspicion," said Senator Mitchell, "that there was anything wrong about the homestead entries or any of them, and I told Pater I would go up to the Land Office at once and ascertain the status of the cases, and asked him to go along with me. He went with me, first giving me an abstract of a paper containing a statement of the 12 different entries, the names of the respective entrymen, and description of the land in each, and the dates of the alleged sales by each to Mrs. Watson, together with the amount alleged to have been paid by her for each claim."

Then the Senator attacked Francis J. Heney, United States District Attorney at Portland in the prosecution of the land fraud cases, accusing him of unprofessional conduct in the juryroom and asserting that subsequent to the convictions in the land fraud cases, early in December, and before sentence had been imposed, Heney, "engaged with United States District Attorney John H. Hall in representing the government in prosecution of said case, entered into an agreement with the said S. A. D. Pater, Emma L. Watson and others included in said conspiracy, by which they offered clemency or leniency of some kind of character, provided they would, by their evidence, involve myself, Mr. Hermann and others in these frauds."

The Senator referred to his long career in the Senate, and said that not until this time had any charges been made against his integrity, either as a man, member of the bar or member of the Senate. It may be thought, he said, by some that he had violated precedent in coming to the Senate at this time, but he declared: "I am an innocent man and I have at this stage of the proceedings the same right as any other Senator to come here in defense of my character, which is as dear to me as that of any other Senator on this floor."

He trusted and believed that the property would come when he could with proper demand of the Senate a thorough investigation of every one of the charges against him. The Senator said in conclusion:

"I have been declared by unproved charges to be unworthy to remain long as your associate, and being conscious of the absolute rectitude of my actions and of my innocence of all wrong, I have deemed it not only my right but my duty to myself and to the members of this Senate that I should come here and thus publicly deny all charges which I know to be absolutely false, and also to explain publicly the acts upon my part which I admit and which are now invoked by the prosecuting officer of the government, and by a portion of the public press, as badges of crime."

Mr. Mitchell's statement consumed about three quarters of an hour. Toward the close his voice was broken and he was compelled to frequently dry his eye with his handkerchief. Many other Senators were visibly affected. When the Senator concluded there was a renewal of handshaking and assurance of confidence on the part of the Senators, while it was necessary for the presiding officer to use the gavel to enpress applause in the galleries. When the reception terminated, Mr. Mitchell resumed his seat, but soon left the chamber.

Downing Objects. Farmers who have timber land to clear are objecting to the passage of the proposed law forbidding the burning of brush during the summer months in Oregon, and if they are all of the same mind as H. P. Downing, a Tualatin farmer, they will give little heed to it. Mr. Downing was in the city recently and said that he had been clearing land in Washington county for 30 years, and that there remains a goodly portion of his 160 acres to clear yet.

"Still the legislature is about to stop us from burning the logs and stumps just because the exposition people want visitors to see Mount Hood," he said. "If we cannot clear our lands what will the fair do for us? This country is getting to be a good deal like Russia when a man can't clear the logs off his place without first applying to the county clerk for a permit. I for one will pay no heed to such a law, and let them arrest me for burning the trash off my place if they feel like it."—Telegram.

A man giving his name as Fred W. Hartley, who was found wandering about Corvallis, Sunday last week, in a demented condition, was adjudged insane and taken to the asylum. No one had ever seen the man, and the only thing that could be learned from him was his name and that he was from Staffordshire, England.

One thousand dollars has been set aside by the board of directors of Pacific University for an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark fair, and it is intended to make the exhibit one of the best along educational lines in the northwest.

There will be four eclipses this year, two of the moon and two of the sun. Only one will be visible in the United States, that of the moon, August 11th.

Warren Cressley, conductor on the motor line between Monmouth and Independence, fell from the rear of his train last Saturday, and was so badly injured that he died in a few hours. He used to be conductor on the Southern Pacific and was one of the oldest railroad men in Oregon.
