Since our last issue County Clerk Goldman has issued the following marriage licenses: Claus Borchers and Armada Dittman, Dell E. Connell and Ida Bellinger, and H. A. Wilson and Elizabeth McDaniel.

Twelve bills passed in the legislature at Salem Wednesday, eleven in the senate and one in the house, and eighteen more were introduced, among which were two by Newell, one for fixing salaries of county officers of Washington county, and the other "for the transportation of insane patients to the asylum."

The first Centennial souvenir copper spoon sold by the Sacajewea societies was bought by Dr. Tamiessie of this city. The spoons are bronze in the light and dark copper shades and make very pretty souvenirs. The principal engraving is the reproduction of the Indian heroine in the bowl of the spoon and on the front of the handle is a picture of Multnomah falls, and Lewis and Clark and the Lewis monument. On the back of the spoon is the seal of Oregon and a view of Mount St. Helens, two pine trees and the characteristic salmon. The copper from which the spoons are made was donated by the owners of the Spirit Lake mines, of which company Dr. Coe of Portland is president and Dr. Tamiessie a stockholder. The copper for the Sacajewea statue at the exposition was donated by this company and will be a permanent monument in the Fair city to the memory of the first woman to set foot on the soil of this Oregon country. The spoons are sold for 75 cents each, and the proceeds go toward swelling the fund for the erection of the Sacajewea monument.

Bailey, stated that the purpose of the gathering was to get the men interested in the work of preparing for the exhibit to be made by Washington county at exposition and to impress upon them the necessity of raising more funds to help along the work, and to induce the county court to increase its appropriation.

Mrs. S. B. Huston, chairman of the committee on exhibits, read a comprehensive statement of the amount of material that had been secured for the exhibit. The judge stated that personally he favored a large appropriation, but he was not the whole board of county commissioners. It is certain that Washington county should be represented at the Lewis and Clark fair. Everybody admits that. 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Railroads Galore.

The Portland Consolidated Railway Company will build an interurban line between Portland and Hillsboro. Work will commence as soon as the most feasible route can be selected and work of construction commenced.

Yesterday a party of surveyors in the employ of the company established their headquarters at the head of Balche's Gulch, on the Cornell road, and with that point as the base, will at once commence the work of selecting the best route into and through the rich Hillsboro country.

So well established is the plan to build that it is expected work on the new project will be begun during the early summer, and the line will be in operation at the end of the year.

It is estimated that the work of establishing the line and putting it into commission will cost the Portland Consolidated Company close to \$1,000,000. The work of grading, securing the right of way and laying the track will alone call for practically \$700,000, while cars of a new and heavy type will have to be built for the passenger traffic and hard service of the interurban run.

It is said the company will build cars for the new line modeled after the Oregon City cars used by the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company, and that at least an hourly service will be established from the first. Later, as traffic develops, the schedule will be shortened to meet the requirements of the district served. It is the intention of the company to also handle freight and special cars will be provided for that department.

This move on the part of the Portland Consolidated shows the real intent of the company to branch out into the districts surrounding Portland and foreshadows a most complete and adequate suburban and interurban fast schedule service.

At the time of the consolidation of the two Portland street-car companies it was hinted that the operations of the merger would not be confined to the street traffic of Portland alone. This belief is borne out by the improvements being planned for extensive shops and barns at the different stations formerly used by the two separate companies.

The proposed scheme of the Oregon Traction Company to build a Hillsboro line, and the added announcement of the Southern Pacific to the effect that a gasoline motor service would be placed on the West Side lines of that company, has, it is thought, hurried the plans of the Portland Consolidated Company, and caused it to take up actively the project which has been sleeping in the managers for some time.

The day of Portland suburban car service is near at hand and the determination of the company to commence construction on the Portland-Hillsboro line shows a new and active era of development in that direction.—Oregonian.

Death of John Peters.

John Peters, an old and esteemed resident of Hillsboro, died at his home last Monday, aged 64 years. He was born at Skibereau, Ireland, 1841, and moved to Hillsboro when six years old. From 1860 until 1889 he was in the employ of the Great Northern Transportation company on the great lakes, after which he boated on the rivers and worked in the Arctic regions for three years, returning to Canada and afterward moved to Nebraska, going from there to the mining regions of the Black Hills in 1876. In 1878 he again returned to Canada and was married to Miss Adelaide Dukelow, who survives him. They arrived in Portland on New Year's day, 1882, and came directly to Hillsboro and to the home where his life was closed.

For twenty-three years he had been an honored member of the M. E. church of this city, twenty of which he was class leader, Sunday school superintendent, trustee or steward. On April 8, 1883, he received the blessing of entire sanctification and passed away in perfect confidence and without suffering.

Mr. Peters leaves his wife, two sons, one daughter, six sisters, two brothers and many sincere friends. The funeral services were held in the M. E. church on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Hamilton officiating, assisted by Rev. H. Oberg of Trinity church, Portland, formerly pastor of the church here. The interment was in Masonic cemetery.

Death has closed the life of an honest man, a faithful Christian, a true and loving husband, father, friend—the best tribute that can be given to any man. He was an honor to himself and the community in which he lived.
