**The Situation in Russia.**  
An unconfirmed report comes from St. Petersburg to the effect that Emperor Nicholas made an attempt to commit suicide, yesterday morning, and was wounded in the hand. The rumor further says that the emperor's designs were frustrated by the intervention of his mother, the Empress Dowager.

An official news agency at St. Petersburg says: "In spite of the general inclination in favor of conclusion of the war, Russia has not proposed any peace conditions nor prepared any such conditions."

"The government is now for peace, but continues to prepare for war," is the attitude of Russia, as described by a prominent diplomat yesterday. The positive statement is made that the United States has not recently taken any steps looking to arranging for peace.

Subscriptions in San Francisco for the new Japanese loan were made Wednesday to the amount of \$3,650,000, or \$1,150,000 in excess of the amount that was to be allotted to the Pacific Coast. Portland and Seattle are yet to be heard from, where subscriptions were to be forwarded through the local banks. It is believed here that these subscriptions will not be considered, as the loan has been so heavily over-subscribed both in the United States and England. Oregon and Washington will wire their subscriptions today, but it is thought orders will be received to close the books before they come in.

Chicago in a few hours Wednesday subscribed for \$15,000,000 of the new Japanese war loan.

The Secretary of State has sent out to the various county assessors blanks on which to list the industrial products of the state in connection with the census enumeration. In getting up the form, the secretary has followed the requirements of an old law enacted in 1864, the last year of the civil war. For moss-backism this form is entitled to first, second and third premiums and in the ring for sweepstakes no competitor need enter. Neither Hogs, Goats nor Mohair is provided for nor mentioned. The products of Oregon forty years ago and which, according to the blanks furnished by the Secretary of State, assessors must follow without any change whatever in making up the census report in this year of 1905, include wheat, oats, barley and rye, corn, potatoes, apples, hay, tobacco, wool, cheese and butter, horses, mules, cattle, sheep, hogs, gold dust, barrels of salmon, baskets of oysters, and lumber. No space is arranged for hops, one of the leading industries of the state, nor are assessors authorized to make record of the number of pounds of mohair sheared. Polk, the Blue Ribbon county, will receive a very black eye by such returns. Marion, Linn, Lane, Benton, Yamhill, Clackamas and Washington will also suffer in the estimation of any who may read the census report being made up on this antiquated form. The absurdity of an enumeration of the industrial products of the state with hops omitted, is apparent to Fourth grade school children of Oregon. Half a million dollars worth of hops were produced in this immediate

vicinity the past season. The output of the state was, approximately, 18,000,000 pounds. The maximum price received was 32 cents; but computing at 30 cents; the hop yield represented \$5,400,000; at 27 cents, \$4,860,000. The production of mohair is an important Oregon industry entitled to recognition by the census department. It is of special interest to Polk county on whose hillside grazes Angora goats of world-wide fame. Polk is the home of goats that captured prizes at St. Louis against the competition of the world, and yet this industry is not considered worthy of mention by the census department. J. L. Hanna, deputy assessor for this precinct, is made to feel the awkwardness of his position in making the rounds as assessor and census enumerator, and finds it necessary to put in much of his time explaining that under the forms furnished and authority given him, he cannot ask as to the quantity of hops and mohair produced nor goats raised.

The West Side Enterprise suggests that the Secretary of State recall the blanks sent out, and if he cannot find authority of law for inserting these three important industries, at least leave blank spaces in which may be written "Hops," "Goats," "Mohair." If the Secretary of State in making out blanks for the enumeration of industrial products is a stickler for the 40-year old law, then he must charge legislators with gross incompetency, in forcing him to follow it. This census form is up to the Secretary of State and legislature. Which will father it.—West Side Enterprise?

**Only Doctor for 2,000 Miles.**  
Among the sparse settlements along the bleak coasts of Labrador and Newfoundland, a young Englishman and Oxford man has given the people for thirteen years practically the only medical comforts they have had. By boat in summer and by dog-train through the snows, he reaches every harbor from Newfoundland to Hudson Strait. He is the comfort and hope of the frugal, care-pinched people of the whole long coast. In the April McClure's this young doctor has written the story of a winter's experience. He writes a simple, direct account of a freely given, arduous service. It has the tang of the cold North about it, and it is a hopeful picture of a little-known people—the farthest outposts of the northern coasts.

William Welch, a resident of Acworth, N. H., was 105 years old last Monday, having been born during the administration of John Adams, the second vice president of the United States. He holds the records of being the oldest pensioner of the civil war, and is just a month younger than Hiram Cronk who holds the same record for the war of 1812. Welch was over 60 years old when he enlisted in Company I, Fourteenth New Hampshire volunteers.
