bers of the local Congregational church as one of the brightest church annals. This afternoon services were held in recognition of the new pastor, Rev. H. W. Boyd, and this evening was given over to the celebration of the 60th anniversary of the church's founding. Both meetings were attended by large audiences that showed an earnest interest in the organization. The church was founded in 1845, and is the oldest organization of its denomination in Ore-

In pioneer days its meetings were held in the same log-house that was occupied by Pacific University. At that time the church and college were closely united. Rev. Harvey Clark, the first pastor, was at the head of the church until 1854, when he was succeeded by Dr. Thomas Condon. Among the early pastors were: Rev. Sidney Harper Marsh, the first president of the university; Rev. E. Walker, Rev. Cushing Ellis and Rev. H. Lyman.

Some of their successors have been Rev. A. Rogers, Rev. A. Rice, Dr. S. M. Freeland, Rev. Morton D. Dunning and Rev. Daniel Staver, who was in charge until the present pastor.

Tonight's exercises were largely a historical review of the church work, C. H. Walker, of Albany, sent a paper telling of the period from the founding up to 1859. A paper covering the years in the old church was given by Rev. M. Eells, of Tacoma, Wash. Hon. A. Hinman, president of the board of trustees of Pacific University, also spoke of early

Principal H. L. Bates, of Tualatin Academy, spoke on the new church. Rev. P. S. Knight was on the programme for an address but could not attend. Rev.
