About 400 indictments charging the Standard oil company with failure to take out peddlers' license, as required by the Kentucky statutes, were returned by the Franklin county grand jury. Similar indictments have been returned recently in several counties in Kentucky.

When informed of the final action of the prudential committee accepting the Rockefeller gift, Rev. Washington Gladden, D. D., said. "The prudential committee has placed itself on the board and intelligible position that all gifts must be received, no matter what may be the character of the giver nor by what immorality or crimes his gains may have been gathered. That is a great testimony from such a high authority. From this decision the appeal will now be taken to the conscience of the Congregational churches and the conscience of Christendom."

Edward Mitchell, at one time a leading figure on the Chicago board of trade, organizer of a corner in wheat in 1868, and once worth millions, is dead at the county hospital in Chicago at 70 years of age, a pauper. His fall came in 1870, only two years after he had cornered the wheat market and made a fortune. Since then he has lived in the hope that he would regain his former wealth. But his failure had so shaken him that he never regained his position, but grew poorer and poorer until in recent years he depended entirely upon charity.

Just before her death in Coffeyville, Kas., last week, in a humble two-room hut, of Mrs. Adeline Spears, 54 years old, the woman called for a lawyer and made a will, bequeathing \$40,000 in cash to her husband, a day laborer. The money she declared, is on deposit in an Oakland (Cal.) bank. The woman and her husband had lived here for seventeen years, and had always been in apparently poor circumstances. Mrs. Spears had often spoken to her neighbors about a legacy her father had left her, held in trust for her by her stepmother, in an Oakland bank. She refused to give her reasons for not claiming the money during her lifetime. She was married to Harvey Spears in Newton, Kan., in 1886. Letters bear out the woman's assertions about the money.

Sixteen thousand babies were born in New York in the last four months and of these less than ten began their existence in the millionaire's district in Fifth avenue, so Register of Vital Statistics Gilfoy reports. He has made a census of the births in the city, and finds that Fifth avenue has the lowest birth rate of any street in town. The heaviest birth rate is on the East Side, near Division street, where the conditions are the reverse of those in Fifth avenue. The coming census by the health department will determine not only what street, but what house, produces the most babies. Fifteen deputies have already been detailed on the work, and the number will be increased to about 400 in a few weeks. The primary object of the movement by the health department is to determine the exact population of the city for a basis of the birth and death rates.

Dr. J. Lee Adams, chief of the claims division of the United States Internal Revenue Bureau, died in Washington City last Sunday, aged 63 years. He had been in the service for forty years.

The dead body of **Jeanie Kintop** was found in the woods last Sunday about four miles from Little Falls, Minn. The body was entirely stripped of clothing, a handkerchief was tightly twisted about her neck, the head was a mass of bruises, and there were evidences of an outrage. Two negroes were seen in the vicinity of where the body was found and search is being made for them. If caught they will probably be lynched. The girl, who was about to leave for the northern part of the state to take up a homestead claim, had been in Little Falls purchasing supplies. She left there for Darling, from which station she was to walk to her home, about two miles distant. After leaving Darling she was not seen again until her body was found. Her empty pocketbook and a parasol she was carrying were found in a ditch near by. Her watch was found on the body.
