Three thousand G. A. R. men are expected in Portland from Oregon, Washington and Alaska June 23, and a large number besides from all over the country. The grand encampment of Oregon City June 21, and that of Washington and Alaska at Vancouver on the same day. Two days will be given over to routine duties and a local reunion and then both gatherings will meet in Portland on the morning of the 23d, when G. A. R. day will be observed at the exposition. The campgrounds at Sellwood are being fixed up for the accommodation of the veterans, and the headquarters will be made there during the time of the exposition. At Oregon City on the 21st and 22d big meetings are to be held. Governor Chamberlain and other speakers will be in attendance, and the governor will be honored by a bevy of young women. Boys to the number of 100 are to appear in khaki uniforms and will in the meantime be drilled in military tactics, so as to form quite a feature in the parade there.

Laying Corner Stone at Bethany.

The laying of the corner-stone for the new German Presbyterian church of Bethany, took place Thursday afternoon June 1, at four o'clock. A goodly number of people from the entire community had assembled to witness the ceremony. Besides the pastor of the church, Rev. Wm. C. Laube, there were present and took part in the exercises, Rev. J. A. H. Wutke, of the Baptist church of Bethany, Rev. J. Smith, of the Bethany M. E. church and Rev. Andrew J. Montgomery, pastor of the Third Presbyterian church of Portland, and Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Portland.

Mr. Montgomery made the principal address, emphasizing the significance of this day to the Bethany church, as marking a new era in its history, and showing the great work that has been done and is still to be done in our great Northwest by the German speaking people. We have but begun to lay the foundations, and there still remain great opportunities, religious and educational as well as materially. Pastor Laube then spoke in German, expressing his gratitude that the undertaking had progressed so far, and calling upon the people to be faithful in the future and to measure up to their great responsibility in laying the foundations of this great commonwealth for future generations.

The corner-stone is a gift of Mr. Otto Schuman, the well-known sculptor of Portland. In a copper box, which was presented by Mr. J. J. Kaderly of Portland, were placed the following articles:—

A German Bible, an English New Testament, a copy of the Westminster Catechism in German and English, a Calendar of the German Presbyterian Church for 1905, a copy of "Der Presbyterianer", the official German church paper, containing the photographs of the different ministers, who have served the Bethany church, a copy of the Assembly Herald, a copy of "Our German Work", a short sketch of the history of the church, and finally, a hand full of Oregon wheat.

While Mr. Chris Schindler, the chairman of the building committee and Mr. T. P. Goodin, the contractor, put the stone in its position, Mr. H. A. Kurati spoke an appropriate recitation.

Besides his regular work at Bethany, Pastor Laube has now taken up work in Mountaineer, and will preach in the new Union church of that place on the third and fifth Sabbath in the month, at three and 8 p. m. The afternoon services will be in English, and the evening service in German. Friends in that community are heartily invited to attend.

New Railroad Project.

A special meeting of the Hillsboro board of trade, was called Thursday at the City hall to meet Mr. Wm. Reid, representing the Portland Nehalem & Tillamook rail road Co. relative to getting the right of way for the railroad from Hillsboro to Banks. The meeting was presided over by Mayor Cornelius and was attended by many business men of Hillsboro, and representatives, farmers and land owners in the country to be traversed by the proposed line. Mr. Reid gave the proposition of the company and many speeches in favor of the plan were made by those present. The railroad company proposes to build a road from Hillsboro to Tillamook with branches to Astoria, and Vernonia, at once, and ask the people of Hillsboro to give the right of way through the city and the farmers along the proposed line, the right of way through their land free of charge.

The deeds of this right of way is not to be given until the line is in operation and trains running.

The mayor of Hillsboro was instructed to appoint a committee of seven, including himself and W. Taylor Hill, of Mountaineer, to secure right of way and report a week from Monday. The time is short but the contract has been let for the building of the road and the company is desirous of beginning operations immediately.

The directors of the company will furnish a guarantee that they have the funds and are in position to complete the road according to the above statement.

The county commissioners have been in session the past two days, but will likely adjourn today. A large number of bills have been passed upon, and much important business transacted. The contract for the Jackson bottom bridge had not been awarded, up to the time of going to press. The bid of S. M. Holland for \$1,900 was the lowest received and he will undoubtedly get the contract as soon as the bond of \$5,000 is executed.

New School House Addition.

The special school meeting Monday, was not very largely attended, but nine voters being present; though more come in as the meeting was about to adjourn. The resolution to build an addition to the school house carried unanimously and arrangements are being made to commence the building at once, in order that it may be completed in time for the opening of the school year. The resolution to issue a quit-claim deed to Mrs. O'Connor, also carried the resolutions are as follows:

Resolved that the school directors of School District No. 7, Washington County Oregon, be authorized to construct an addition to the school house, and for that purpose to borrow \$1500.00, or such sum as may be necessary, to pay for the same, and to issue interest bearing warrants therefor, payable at such times, and upon such terms, as they shall deem to be to the best advantage of said district.

Whereas, School District No. 7, Washington County, Oregon, was formerly the owner of lots 5 & 6 in block 9, of the Town of Hillsboro: And

Whereas, about March 3, 1890, at a regular meeting of said school district, the legal voters of said district attempted to authorize the directors of said school district to sell said real estate, at public auction, to the highest bidder: And

Whereas, by a mistake, the record of said school meeting shows that they were authorized to sell lots 6 & 7, in Block 9, in said Town of Hillsboro: And

Whereas, thereafter, the school directors of said district, in accordance with said resolution, advertised said property and sold the same, at public auction, to William McQuillan for the sum of \$1210.00, and, thereafter, the directors of said district duly conveyed to said William McQuillan said lots 6 & 7, in Block 9, in the Town of Hillsboro, instead of lots 5 & 6, as it should have been: And

Whereas, by mesne conveyances Mrs. Ella O'Connor has succeeded to such rights as were conveyed by said deed: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the school directors of school district No. 7, Washington County, Oregon, be authorized to execute a quit-claim deed on behalf of said school district, to Mrs. Ella O'Connor, her heirs or assigns.
