The body was taken to Beaverton, and Saturday morning was transferred to the charge of the coroner at Portland.

The celebration will be preceded by a three days' encampment of the Washington County Veterans' Association. Literary programmes will be carried out each afternoon and evening with special religious services on the grounds Sunday. Sermons will be delivered by Rev. C. F. Clapp, of Forest Grove, and Rev. F. B. Stout and C. T. Wilson, of Portland. On the Fourth, the usual parade and programme of sports will occur. Judge Hollis, of Forest Grove, will make the address of the day.

Everyone has become quite accustomed to the idea; that the promised motor service will become a reality some day.

Newburg is to have a fourth of July celebration and it will be unique, an innovation, in fact. The tall feathers of the Eagles will not be pulled. The glories of gory battlefields are not to be pictured. The line-light will be shifted from Bunker Hill and Yorktown to the Hagye. The celebration is to take on the big peace demonstration. The Ministerial Association has taken the matter under advisement, and made suggestion to, "let the usual oratorical pyrotechnics on war and its glories be dispensed with. Peace hath her victories no less than war. Let them be celebrated this year. Let us get a big demonstration in the interests of peace and show to the world our convictions." The idea "took," and arrangements are being made accordingly. Rev. H. T. Cash, pastor of the Friends Church, and naturally an ardent advocate of peace doctrines, has been put in as general manager, with eight committees working under him. He expects to have 1000 Sunday school children, from all over the county, to sing and sing hymns and led by the Goddess of Peace. There will be a big picnic dinner and barbecue at noon. The rest of the day will be spent very much as commonly, with a baseball game and sports and fireworks in the evening. Newburg's "20th Century celebration" will be looked forward to with much interest.
