Baptist Association Convention.

The Willamette Baptist Association held their district convention in this city Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. The attendance has been large; about one hundred and fifty visitors being in attendance. The ladies of the local church served dinner in Wehrung's hall, each day for the visiting members. Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, evangelistic praise services were held on corner of Main and Second streets. During the year, this district has established new churches at University park and West Union. It was reported that there has been an average of 373 new churches, established per day in the world, during the last three years. In 1904 there were 240,000 Baptist churches alone established in the United States, with over 1,500,000 new members in the world during that time. The next district convention will be held in the Second Baptist church in Portland, June 1906. The officers elected were: Rev. C. A. Nutley, Gresham, moderator; Rev. G. A. Learn, of Grace church Portland, clerk; W. L. Morgan, of the Central Baptist church, Treasurer; G. E. Strayer, Y. M. C. A. Portland, representative and correspondent for the "Pacific Baptist."
