The jury in the Mitchell case has brought in a verdict of "guilty as charged in the indictment." While this is a hard blow to the defendant and the many friends of the senator who have hoped the charges brought against him were without foundation, it is even a larger one to the state of Oregon. A hard number of people who read Mr. Mitchell's utterances on the floor of the United States senate, when with tears rolling down his aged cheeks, he proclaimed his innocence, have hoped that he could prove his assertions. This he has failed to do, for the jury has proclaimed him guilty, and that verdict must stand until removed, if it ever is, by a higher court. Guilty or innocent, this war against the lumber thieves is all right and should be pushed to a finish until every man guilty with crime is made to suffer, no matter how high he may stand in social, financial or national fame. One thing is no better than another. If there is any difference, the smaller should be given the preference. Mr. Mitchell has done much for Oregon, thousands of people have had faith in him, and even now, in the face of the verdict of twelve men, it will be hard to convince his friends that he is really guilty of an intended crime.

Reports of Fourth of July casualties are coming in slowly but surely and the crop promises to be fully as abundant as in former years. Only one accident is reported from Salem, where Roy Brown had a blank cartridge fired in his face. He may lose his eyesight. A boy fatally wounded, two men and a boy hurt by a cannon cracker were early grists to the great Chicago casualty mill. Charles Strolow, 19 years old was shot and killed a little later in the day. Harry Hind, 6 years old, was fatally injured by a companion playfully pointing an old revolver at him. It was loaded. Charlie Bennett, 20 years old, was shot in the knee by a policeman, and a mob of about 200 tried to hang the bluecoat. W. J. O'Brien was hit in the foot by a stray bullet, but Burt Butler looked into the end of a cannon cracker and is now in darkness and two or three fingers are lost in the great city. These are but a few of the many accidents in Chicago on the Fourth, but it is safe to say 1905 will hold its own with the record of other years.

Congressman Hermann's case in the land fraud trial has been placed at the end of the calendar, which is supposed to indicate that he will be first brought to trial on the indictment returned against him at Washington, D. C. The Portland Telegram says that the trial of Senator John H. Mitchell was merely preliminary to a thorough probing of alleged crimes against the government in this state by the fraudulent acquisition of public lands was shown in the United States court Wednesday when the other cases based on the indictments brought by the recent grand jury were brought up and set for hearing. They implicated many prominent men in the state, the list being headed by Congressman Williamson and Hermann. Cases in which Senator Mitchell is involved were on Wednesday placed at the foot of the calendar, indicating, probably, that he will not again be held for alleged offenses against the government. Congressman Williamson's case is set for today.

The twelfth annual reunion of the Washington County Veterans Association was held at Cornelius July 1, 2 and 3, and was not as largely attended as in former years. Monday was Hillsboro Day when the attendance from this city was greater than on any other day during the encampment. The program was furnished by Hillsboro talent and included music by the ladies' band, a flag drill by sixteen girls, recitations and singing. Sunday morning Rev. C. F. Clapp of Forest Grove preached in the grove; Rev. Hamilton of this city preached at 2:30, and Rev. Sanderson of Forest Grove conducted the evening services. On Monday officers were elected for the ensuing year, they are: President, Comrade Hoopes; of Gaston; First Vice-President, E. Cranford, of Hillsboro; second vice-president, B. W. McNutt, Cornelius; Comrade Fitch, Cornelius; Comrade Howell, Beaverton; treasurer, Francis Haines, Hillsboro, chaplain. At 2 o'clock Monday the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary met at their headquarters and elected the following officers: President, Mrs. E. O. Crandall, Hillsboro; first vice-president, Mrs. Wheeler, Forest Grove; second vice-president, Mrs. R. W. McNutt, Cornelius; secretary, Mrs. Leach, Forest Grove; treasurer, Mrs. J. E. Lattin, Hillsboro. The semi annual meeting will be held in Forest Grove in October. The old soldiers wound up their encampment by joining with the others in celebrating the Fourth in the grove. The crowd is said to have been the largest ever seen from this city. Judge Hollie delivered the oration of the day and held the attention of the great crowd for more than an hour.

A Case of Sour Grapes. Hillsboro is very much agitated over the Wm. Reid railroad proposal which he is now offering that city. The anxiety of the railroad company which he is said to represent, in hurrying to begin work, is very much like other railroad propositions. As a rule they can never begin work quick enough. There is always some slowness on the part of the giver of the right of way, and it is always his fault that there is so much delay. But usually railroad companies are not modest in their demands; this one, however only wants to go to Banks-nine or ten miles in the country. Perhaps that's far enough for this road.—Forest Grove News.

And yet, the people of Forest Grove offered \$10,000 bonus to get that same road to go through their town, but failing in their endeavors, commenced to "knock." In Hillsboro things are different. While a few people oppose anything in the shape of advancement, the great majority work for everything that will improve the future of our city. Result, "On to Tillamook!"
