THE GREAT FAIR AT PORTLAND

Events of the Past Week—Montana Cities Celebrate Next Week—Notes of Interest.

The attendance at the fair so far has been much beyond the expectations of the management and of Portland people. This has been Western Artisans' week, and will close tomorrow with Joaquin Miller Day, when the veteran poet of the Sierras will be present to receive the honors due him at the hands of the people of the state in which he was reared, and which he has celebrated by his verse.

Some 2,000 doctors with their wives and families are present this week to attend the most notable gathering of medical men ever held on the Pacific Coast, the convention of the American Medical Association.

Montana cities will have special days next week, and July 20th has been designated as Montana Day. The convention of the National Association are also slated for the week and the Lewis and Clark Methodist Congress and Lewis and Clark Dental Congress will be features.

Centennial Notes.

Fifty gorrotes of the head-bunting tribe will reach Portland about the 1st of August. They will build a village on the fair ground of their native haunts and become a feature of the exposition.

Somebody has unearthed from the files of the Scientific American this little item, of present interest, which was printed in the issue of September 2, 1893: "In cutting some timber in Omana, a few days since, a bullet was found embedded in the trunk of a rock elm. The grains which had overgrown it show that it must have been deposited sixty-two years ago, a time when the country had not yet been visited by any white men, except the explorers, Lewis and Clark."

The skull and horns of a Rocky Mountain sheep were found some time ago by an Idaho man, firmly imbedded twenty feet from the ground in the trunk of a tree. The section containing the curiosity is at the exposition where it is attracting much attention. It is presumed that, when the tree was a sapling, the sheep got tangled in its branches and died. As the sapling grew into a tree, the sheep was lifted heavenward and its skull and horns became embedded in the trunk.

Heliograph signals are now being flashed from the snow-line of Mt. Hood to a station near the Government building on the Lewis and Clark exposition grounds, seventy miles distant. Mt. Hood appears to be but three or four miles away. A squad of United States troops, in command of a lieutenant, has established a signal station near the summit of the grand old peak, and the exhibition is in daily communication with the mountain. Several parties of adventurous people will climb to the summit of Mt. Hood during the summer, as a sort of side trip from Portland, the exposition.

The Fourth of July attendance at the Lewis and Clark exposition was 53,708. This is at least 30 per cent more than the most sanguine of the officials expected. It beats the Fourth of July attendance at the Omaha exposition by nearly 10,000 and is 14,131 higher than the attendance on the opening day at Portland, June 1. Up to July 4 half a million admissions had been recorded in the thirty-four days of the big fair. This aggregate is far above expectations. The attendance is increasing daily, and indications point to a total that will break every exposition record, considering the neighboring population. The fair will run until October 15.
