Official Paper of Washington County.

Walter Gerking, son of B. F. Gerking, was found dead last Monday in his tent at Camp Overall, on the west fork of Hood river. Young Gerking suffered a sunstroke in the harvest field two years ago in Eastern Oregon, and of late has been despondent. It is thought to be a case of suicide.

The heat at Dallas last Sunday was intense, the thermometer reaching from 100 to 103 in the shade. It was the hottest day of the year in that section. It is helping to destroy the hop vermin. Harvesting has commenced in many places and the yield is reported good.

The temperature at Lewiston, Idaho, has not dropped below the 100 mark in the past week and at times it has reached 109, with hot winds prevailing. Reports from Lewiston Valley are to the effect that the damage to late sown spring grain will amount to 10 to 15 percent of the entire crop. Much of the late grain will be cut for hay.

Officials of the Forest Grove board of trade have received word that the Southern Pacific will put on a new train between Forest Grove and Portland some day this week. According to this report the train will leave Forest Grove at 12:30 noon, and returning, leave Portland at 10:45 p. m. This schedule will suit Hillsboro people and undoubtedly be well patronized.

George Ford, a fair visitor from Boston, took dinner in a Portland restaurant and when settling with the waiter made up his mind that he had been flim-flamed out of a part of his change, so to show his disapproval of shady transactions, he slapped the waiter's face good and plenty. While a call for the police was being sent in, Ford skipped for Washington county, but was captured and taken to the station. He says he struck the blow in self defense.

Secretary Harvey Cross states that while the attendance at this year's session of the Willamette Valley Chautauque association at Oregon City was not up to expectations, the management will be able to meet all expenses, a condition that assures the holding of another assembly next year. Too many counter attractions were responsible for the decrease in attendance and the receipts of this year's meeting, although the program was up to the high standard of excellence established by preceding sessions.

It begins to look as if the only thing that can remove from this earth the murderer of Banker Rice is a stick of dynamite or the hand of Providence. He has been beating the hangman out a job for a number of years, and now the New York court of appeals has granted a stay of execution, on the ground that important points were overlooked in the case, and now Albert T. Patrick has another lease of life until next October at least. Patrick must have got away with a big roll of the banker's money, for his light for life has been very expensive.

Farmers in all sections of Umatilla county are now engaged in harvesting the wheat crop and most favorable reports of the yield have been received. It is the general opinion that the yield of the county will exceed 5,000,000 bushels. Reservation farmers expect an unusually fine yield and satisfactory reports are coming in from those who have commenced cutting. Some stands will average as high as forty-five bushels to the acre, but it is generally believed that the reservation wheat section will average about forty bushels. With the exception of spring green wheat, no damage was caused by the hot wave of last week.

The mayor of New Orleans has issued a proclamation to the people of that city urging them to heed the advice of the health authorities relative to the sanitation of their premises and calling special attention to the necessity of screening the houses and placing nets over cisterns and all pools of water which might breed mosquitoes. At a recent meeting of the Louisiana State Board of Health it was decided, in response to numerous requests for information from the parish health officers, to prepare and send out a detailed statement of the situation. This will include an official statement that up to date there have been seventeen cases of yellow fever in New Orleans and six deaths. The quarantine regulations suggested by the meeting of the citizens the other night, requiring six days detention for all vessels from ports liable to yellow fever, were adopted.

The Oregon Tradesman says it is all wrong to use the name of "Webfoot" when speaking of Oregon. "It has been almost a matter of pride with many Oregonians to dwell on the alleged excessive rainfall. It has become a byword and a reproach. It does the state no good, and it has been exaggerated until many are afraid to come to the coast on account of the steady downpour of water which they believe begins the first of September and lasts, without a moment's cessation until the middle of May. Oregon has rain all right, but she has no more than many other parts of the United States. Her climate is well-nigh perfect and has nothing with which to find fault. The rains produce the marvelous vegetation of which we are so proud and which catches the attention of the easterners first of all. Rain falls gently at times during the year, but the wet season has been so magnified that it

has become a source of terror to many who do not really know the facts. Don't advertise a fault, especially when it does not exist."

A dispatch from Annapolis, Md., says that the body of John Paul Jones now rests on American soil, housed temporarily in an unpretentious vault in the center of the grounds of the naval academy and near the unfinished chapel in whose crypt later it is to find honored repose, a perpetual inspiration to the young men of the nation here trained in the arts of naval warfare. The solemn evolutions of the funeral cortege, the impressive spectacle of the white-clad jacks, marines and midshipmen, as they stood in solid phalanx on the sea wall and later surrounded in profound silence the cradle-draped tomb, the trembling words of praise and supplication of the black-robed chaplain before the bier, on the threshold of the vault, the deposit of the body, the musket fire in volleys and the sounding taps, all these were in keeping with the revered memory to which honor was done. The people of Indianapolis added their presence to the quiet demonstration, surrounding the cordon of the naval personnel with bare heads and in respectful silence. The only words that were uttered during the entire transfer from ship to shore were the prayer of the chaplain just before the body was placed in the tomb.

"No power on earth can prevent a jackass from braying. This court is powerless to afford relief in this case and the injunction is dissolved," said Judge Dana in dismissing a suit brought by the postmistress of Richmond, Kan., against the owners of a number of jackasses to prevent their braying. Tibbetts & Hotz own a livery stable in Richmond and it is the next door neighbor to the postoffice. The postmistress resides in the apartments over the postoffice and she has been sorely annoyed during the night by the raucous braying of the discontented jacks in the livery barn. Whenever she sought to while away the tedious hours by singing softly to herself, the jacks would break in and agitate the atmosphere with their distracting noise. At night, when she raised her windows to get a breath of fresh air, her ears would be benumbed by the hee-haw of the jacks. She appealed to the owners of the stable to suppress the braying of a jackass. They politely informed her that to bray was the chief delight and function of a jackass and they could not prevent it. Furthermore the nature of their business precluded sending the offending animals away for the night. Finally she appealed to the court and secured from a judge in Shawnee county a temporary injunction against Tibbetts & Hotz. Then she gave final warning to them that the noise must cease. They immediately took the case before Judge Dana and it was argued. It was one of the most unique hearings in the history of Kansas even, which is the author and scene of many unique things. In their reply to the injunction Tibbetts & Hotz set up that the courts, and in fact, all human machinery, stood absolutely powerless to prevent the braying of a jackass. They cited instances where various expedients had been tried, such as dynamite, muzzling, solitary confinement, etc., but all efforts proved futile. It was ably argued before the court that the Missouri and Kansas jack or mule was a unique feature in the eyes of the world and entitled to consideration. It was shown that pages of comic weeklies are devoted to this peculiar animal and his prediction for braying and kicking. These had been peculiarities of the jackass from the beginning of the world, and would be so to the end thereof.
