LATE NEWS.

The telegraphers' strike is on in earnest and traffic is badly demoralized on both the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern. Yesterday's dispatches report a head-on collision on the Northern Pacific east of Helena. One rumor is that two passengers collided, another is that a freight and passenger were wrecked. It is reported from St. Paul that a collision occurred Wednesday night on the Great Northern east of Havre. It is not stated whether they were passenger or freight.

The yellow fever at New Orleans is still on the increase. Number of new cases up to yesterday were 32; total cases, 378; number of deaths Wednesday, 11; total number of deaths, 79. Practically all of the deaths were of Italians.

Richard Watkins, of Oregon City, committed suicide Wednesday by taking an overdose of opium. The girl Watkins expected to marry changed her mind and married another man Tuesday.

Worry over the bad conduct of her two sons drove Mrs. Harriet L. Cornett, of Sweet Home, Or., insane, and on Wednesday she was committed to the asylum at Salem. The boys were arrested for forgery and burglary.

The jury in the Williamson et al. land fraud case, were escorted to the jury room by the sheriff at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon and locked in. At 11 o'clock that night no agreement had been reached, and yesterday morning the same report was given out. It is intimated that there will be a disagreement.

Circuit Court.

Court opened on Monday morning at 10 o'clock with the following proceedings: Albert G. Watson, on the charge of contempt of court, entered a plea of not guilty; bond changed to \$100 and bond in cash given. Hegen vs. Bohart, suit to quiet title; demurrer overruled; plaintiff given until August 1st, to file reply. White vs. White, divorce; motion to extend time sustained, and defendant allowed until Saturday, July 29, to file answer. Crow vs. Crow, defendant allowed until Tuesday to answer. Bryne vs. Bryne, divorce; restraining order modified so as to allow defendant to harvest crop, but is forbidden to molest plaintiff or children. Tuesday, August 1.—Portland, Nehalem & Tillamook R. R. vs. E. T. Turner, suit to obtain right-of-way; settled by paying plaintiff \$300. All jurors excused for the term. Nina Crow vs. C. T. Crow, divorce; decree granted as prayed for. Wednesday, August 2.—State of Oregon vs. Oliver Chowning; selling liquor without a license, two indictments on same charge; defendant arraigned and allowed until the first day of next term of court to enter his plea on both indictments. State of Oregon vs. Henry Bremer, indicted for firing saloon at Dilley, "not a true bill" returned and defendant discharged. White against White, divorce; decision Friday. State of Oregon vs. Albert G. Watson, contempt of court; bond furnished in the sum of \$100 previously furnished returned. State of Oregon vs. E. A. Ives, unlawful cohabitation; and Geo. Turpin, assault with deadly weapon; ordered that district attorney have until the first day of the next term of court to prepare and file indictments in each case. Thursday, August 3.—Emma Giltner White vs. Eugene D. White, divorce; decree as prayed for and for property. J. W. Shute vs. Washington county, injunction; decree as prayed for. Littlehales vs. Baseline Lumber Co., action for money; complaint dismissed. E. W. Haines vs. E. J. Hubbert; action for money; decree for plaintiff against Baseline Co., and dismissed as to Hare without costs. Suits were commenced in the county court Wednesday against Oliver Chowning, who ran a gallon house at Dilley, one by Corlents & Levy for \$101.01 and another by Blamauer & Hock, and both of Portland for \$158, and the insurance on his saloon building, which recently burned at Dilley, has been attached to satisfy the claims. Chowning also gave a bond of \$500 to appear at the November term of court to answer a charge of selling liquor without a license.

Crop Report.

The past week was dry and warm, but not so warm as the preceding week. All late crops would be benefited by rain, but they are doing fairly well without it. The fall grain harvest is well advanced and the yields generally are extra good, both as to quality and quantity. The spring wheat harvest is now becoming general, and whereas the yields were shortened somewhat by the preceding hot weather, the damage turns out to be less than expected. Pasturage is getting dry, but stock as a rule continues in excellent condition. The second alfalfa crop is being harvested, with satisfactory returns. Hops are doing well, and the hot weather, combined with more spraying of the vines than usual, has caused the lice to nearly all disappear, and the crop now promises to be a better one than expected a few weeks ago. Field onions are ripening rapidly and late potatoes are thriving and promising. Some damage is being done in Washington county to late potato tops by army worms. Corn is tasseling and making good advancement. Early peaches are in the market. Apples are doing well, but Italian prunes are dropping more than they usually do at this season of the year.
