This board will contain the several lines of electric light wire and is so constructed as to have each system separately fused. In doing this it will not be necessary for the whole town to be without light, as it has been heretofore, when one line was short-circuited. The trouble can be located at once and repaired while the current is on.

The Independent mentioned a complaint made by water consumer who ran hot water plants because water has been shut off without warning from the water tower. Alderman Dennis informs us that these occurrences have always been caused by a breakage in the pipes at the plant, and it is absolutely necessary to shut down instantly, but at no time has a hot-water plant been in danger, for Supt. Ringle has them in mind, and if the break could not be mended in a short time, parties using hot water would be notified at once. The wells at the pumping station have been cleaned out this week, and instead of finding five or six feet of sand in the wells, only about two feet had accumulated. Mr. Dennis states that the water and light committee is doing its best to furnish consumers with water, and at the same time keep the city protected in case of fire, so that much of this kicking is all unfounded.

Death of a Pioneer.

At the age of 80 years, Noah Jobe, a pioneer, passed away at his home, one mile west of this city, his death being attributed to old age and dropsy. He returned on Thursday last week from a visit with a daughter in Kamah, Idaho, where he was taken ill, was accompanied to his home here, when he grew rapidly worse, and on Monday night at 12 o'clock closed his eyes in death.

Noah Jobe was respected by all who knew him and had many friends. He crossed the plains in 1845 took up the donation claim of 666 acres where he made his home until his death. He was a veteran of the Indian war of 1847-8 and a miner in the California gold fields in 1849. On February, 1851, he was married to Lydia Gaswood, who died in 1900. He leaves six children, as follows: Rebecca J. Pomeroy, Kamiah, Idaho; James A. Jobe, of British Columbia; Tilburn A. Jobe, of Waseca; Martin E. Jobe, of Nez Perce, Idaho; Wm. F. Jobe, of Portland, and Mrs. W. H. Taylor of this city. The funeral was held from the home where he had lived so many years, on Wednesday afternoon, and the remains were laid to rest in the Odd Fellows cemetery. Mr. Jobe was so ill that it was necessary to bring him home from Idaho on a cot.

Farmers here are disposed to feel gloomy over the present outlook of the hop, onion, and potato crops, the consensus of opinion being that a shortage will be found to exist throughout, and worse still a corresponding depression in prices over last season's yield.

It is of sufficient capacity to accommodate all the children in the district. It is denominational in character, Rev. Thos. S. Wilkes, formerly of this city, but for the last four years in the civil service at Denver, Col., and later at Phoenix, Ariz., has resigned his position in the service of the government, and has returned to this city. He intends to return to Phoenix in a short time in the interest of his change-making cash register, which he has invented and patented. Tom thinks he has a great thing, and expects to sell the patent right to some concern that will manufacture the machine in the near future. He is applying for foreign patents, and expects to introduce it into foreign countries as soon as he can make the necessary arrangements. His machine, briefly stated, does the same work of the common cash register, besides makes change absolutely correct, and cannot be cheated by a dishonest clerk or a counterfeit coin. Mr. Wilkes has had flattering offers for his invention, but has refused all of them. He has made a machine which is on exhibit at Phoenix, and it works perfectly, so his theory has been demonstrated by a complete machine that has been pronounced by experts to be entirely satisfactory in all respects. Mr. Wilkes has other patents under consideration, as soon as he expects to begin work on arrangements with his cash register and change making device.
