Threshing is now practically completed and the grain crop it is thought will about equal that of last year. Pasturage is very short and stock is losing flesh, especially in the dairy districts where the supply of milk is even less than usual at this time of the year. Corn is doing well tinnes good for a week or two longer. Potatoes badly need rain and this crop is uneven, its condition being dependent upon the soil and the time of planting. 
