Multnomah county granted 49 divorces last month, 21 of them on the 8th. Two hundred and fifty-nine marriage licenses were issued during the same month, and only six insane people were sent to the asylum. In the city of Portland the sum of \$87,867.98 was paid into the city treasury for the third quarter ending last Friday, \$55,791.75 of which was for the sale of liquor; groceries and restaurants serving liquor, \$893.35; vehicles, \$7,979.75; merchants and manufacturers, \$7,672.61; physicians and dentists, \$66.50; hawkers, 1,850.85; second-hand merchants, \$440; insurance agents \$1,370; miscellaneous, \$10,421, and \$3,373 was collected for dogs.

Fred, the 10-year-old son of Z. T. Cole, of Sandpit, met with an accident Saturday that cost him the loss of part of two digits on the right hand. While chopping wood the axe he was using came in contact with a limb overhead deflecting its course and unfortunately caught the fingers in its descent and severed them completely near the first joint. The little fellow was compelled to undergo a reamputation shortly afterwards in order to aid nature in healing the parts.

A bold attempt was made by a burglar Friday evening about 9 o'clock to rob the general merchandise store of J. C. Smock of this place. Ira, a son and clerk of the proprietor, sleeps in the store and had closed the establishment a half hour or more and gone out temporarily and during his absence the robber had broken a pane of glass in the rear door, inserted his hand and unlocked the door and was found stooping behind the counter, near the cash register preparatory to making a raid upon the machine. Smock's sudden entrance startled the foot-pad who rose up and commenced firing his gun at close range, retreating at the same time for the rear door, the fire being returned shot for shot. He finally succeeded in his exit at the rear without receiving any personal damage and escaped leaving his hat behind him. The consequent excitement and poor light, as well as poor marksmanship, on both sides would probably account for the lack of wounds to either. A show case was fractured by a shot, several marks on the floor, counters and a bullet hole through the rear door are in evidence of the all but sanguinary encounter. A light colored wool hat, similar to one worn during the day by a stranger is on exhibit at the store—the stranger being minus quantity in these parts just at present.

Mr. Bernard said he did not have a cent in the house, when the thug shoved a gun in the old man's face and said, "Come, get that money, and get it d—d quick!" Of course he "got" and so did the highwayman, and along with him \$23. This hold-up business is getting altogether too frequent, and the killing of a few of these thugs and cut-throats might help to put a stop to it.

One day last week the county clerk of Multnomah county issued 320 hunter's licenses and had to hire extra help to keep up with the rush. "I am of the opinion that the law should be amended so that the state would pay at least for the expense of issuing these licenses," said the clerk of that county, and most everybody will agree with him.
