At a meeting of the executive board of the Washington County Sunday School association, District No. 6, which met in this city October 19, R. H. Railroad News.

The following from The Portland Telegram of Tuesday gives about all the news there is in regard to the railroad situation. It is now only a matter of a few preliminaries when work will be resumed on the line between Hillsboro and Banks. There has been money placed in the Shute Bank, and offices will be established here, and as soon as Mr. Lytle, a brother of E. E. Lytle, can do so, he will move to Hillsboro as general manager of the new line. He was in the city Monday looking over the field and making some inquiries for a residence and offices.

Hillsboro's Board of Trade is free to turn over to the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company ten miles of right-of-way from Hillsboro to Banks, which until yesterday was held by the Portland, Nehalem & Tillamook Railway Company. At a meeting of the stockholders of the latter corporation yesterday the action of the directors a few days ago in adopting a resolution favoring the transfer of the right of way to the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company was ratified.

E. E. Lytle and associates, who are behind the P. R. & N. Co., ask that in addition to the right of way being released that terminal grounds be provided and that bonds be subscribed to the amount of \$40,000. This proposition has been submitted to the Board of Trade, and when the preliminaries have been settled with the agreement with the P. R. & N. T., to April 30, 1906. Prizes Awarded.

Complete returns of prizes awarded to Oregon and Oregon exhibitors in the Horticultural division at the Lewis and Clark exposition were announced Wednesday by Director of Exhibits Henry E. Dorsch. The list was compiled from findings presented by group jurors two weeks ago.

Oregon took a total of 987 awards, of which 101 are gold, 153 silver, 348 bronze and 392 diplomas of honorable mention. Just what Oregon's standing is, as compared with other competing states is not known definitely at this time. It is known that neighboring states have piled up many awards but at this time it is believed Oregon leads all competitors in horticultural exhibits. The results obtained from other states are announced soon. In making the announcements at this time Colonel Dorsch is establishing a new record. He intends to have the medals and diplomas distributed within two weeks. The time usually required for the work is several months and all awards at the St. Louis exposition are not even yet distributed.

In its exhibits of fruits Oregon covered itself with glory. The state got gold medals for gold storage apples, crop of '05 peaches, cherries, strawberries, grapes, peach-plums, watermelons and cantaloupes. Silver medals were awarded for apples of last year's crop, pears, lemons, apricots and vegetables. A bronze medal was awarded for cranberries.

Aside from these awards the great load of diplomas were secured through the exhibits made by Oregon counties. These counties have made a remarkable showing in an infinite variety of fruits, a fact that establishes Oregon as a state of remarkable adaptability for the growing of fruit.

Oregon county has the greater number of awards. It secured a total of 112, of which 18 are gold medals, 19 silver, 41 bronze, and 34 diplomas of honorable mention. Wasco has 98 awards, 22 of them gold, 22 silver, 21 bronze and 17 diplomas of honorable mention. Umatilla county, in third place, has 77 awards, 16 being gold medals, 11 silver, 26 bronze and 24 diplomas of honorable mention. The remainder of the other participating counties is as follows:
