At a meeting called by the president of the Lewis and Clark club Wednesday afternoon, it was decided to balance the organization. There is a balance of \$11 in the hands of the treasurer, which will remain in her keeping until it is decided what final disposition is to be made of it.

The Washington County Republican Central committee held a meeting yesterday afternoon at the court house. Remarks were made by Messrs. Tongue, Barrett, Cornelius, Wood, Marsh and others, plans mapped out for the future, and several vacancies on the committee will be filled later. There was a fair attendance and considerable interest was manifested.

Commissioner W. T. Butler had made up his mind not to accept a renomination, but many of his friends insisted on his going before the people again, and late yesterday afternoon he consented to do so. Mr. Butler has made a careful and competent commissioner and is a valuable man to the county. His nomination means an election, and he should be nominated.

J. C. Bower, mail carrier on route one, met with an accident yesterday afternoon which fortunately resulted without injury to him, but he had enough soft earth on his clothing to lay out a road. While driving on Second street the front wheels of the toy buggy he was in parted with the hind wheels, and the horses hiked out toward the depot at a lively clip. The carriage top turned over taking Mr. Bowers with it, and both took a slide in the mud. No particular damage was done.

L. F. Freeman, who two or three weeks ago made things hum about town by riding his horse up and down the streets, shouting at the top of his voice, giving the night-watchman the horse laugh, and occasionally offering the crowd a drink from a bottle he carried in his hip pocket, came to town Wednesday and was nabbed by the city marshal. Justice Bagley gave the festive gentleman a fine of \$30 or twenty-five days in jail, and he is now occupying the same cell his nephew did for taking part in the street scene that night.

C. E. Kindt, of Kinton, was in the city Wednesday transacting business at the court house with reference to an estate in Crook county. While here Mr. Kindt stated that the prospects of the Pacific Railway and Navigation Company building from this place to Oswego are very bright. Speaking of politics Mr. Kindt gave it as his opinion that the coming campaign will see the republican party united throughout the entire state as it has not been for years past and that the next governor of Oregon will be a republican without a doubt. Now that Mr. Kindt has become a permanent resident of this county it is expected that he will take an active interest in its politics and vigorously and aggressively support the principles and politics of the republican party to which he has always been a staunch adherent.

Haines, of Forest Grove, is the senator, and A. B. Flint, of Scholla; W. K. Newall, of Dilley, and M. S. Barnes, of Beaverton, are the representatives.

The Ladies Civic Improvement and Political Study Club held a largely attended meeting Tuesday evening in the Hotel Tualatin parlors, at which quite a number of gentlemen, were present. The matter of civic improvement was taken up and discussed at length. The question of putting a clock in the Washington county court house tower came up, and while it was favored by some, a majority of those present favored turning all their energies toward securing a park for the city, and it was decided to take the matter up and see what can be done. Several beautiful sites were spoken of which could be purchased at reasonable figures, and a committee of six gentlemen was named to look up each location, get the lowest possible price, and to report at the next meeting. It is a huge undertaking for the ladies to take hold of, but they feel that the only way to get a park is to go after it. It is certain a park is needed and it can never be purchased cheaper than at the present time. If everybody will encourage the movement, help the ladies along in their efforts to procure sufficient funds to buy the land, inside of five years Hillsboro will have something to be proud of. "Nothing succeeds like success," and in this matter of procuring a city park the ladies are bound to succeed. At the close of the meeting light refreshments were served.

The Crescent is the name given to the new theatre building now fast approaching completion at the corner of Main and First streets, and it will be thrown open to the public about the middle of February, when home talent will put on the boards "Tony, the Convict." When completed, Hillsboro can boast of one of the best theatre buildings in Oregon, and the best arranged and equipped. Grand in Portland, of any in the whole state. Besides the drop curtain, there are three others representing a street scene, a garden and woods scene, each of which have side scenery to match. The drop curtain is a work of art, being centered with a beautiful rural view, the old mill, with its almost forgotten wheel that was wont to make music for the people of a hundred years ago; the old homestead and the millpond, in which two children are angling with hook and line. Around the view is painted in letters both great and small advertisements of some of our business men, a reminder that at such a place you can buy shoes, at another groceries, feed, clothing, the overalls that never rip, and a card with a key painted thereon tells the thirsty waiter to get his beer. The furniture dealer invites trade in his line, while the undertaker informs all who look where they can have their job performed neat and nice when their theatre days are passed. The curtains are raised and lowered by rope and pulleys and is a great improvement over the old mode, more than a mile of rope being used in handling the scenery and curtains, and the latter are 25 feet in width by 22 feet high. The seats are built amphitheatre, 17 rows on the ground floor and 11 upstairs, including those in what is termed "nigger heaven." The dressing rooms are in the basement, below the stage, and are easily reached by steps, and the whole building will be warmed by furnaces. The scenery and curtains was furnished by the Twin City Scenic Co., of Minneapolis, Minn., and are said to be the finest in the state, being up to date in every particular. Hillsboro people can well be proud of their new place of amusement and much credit is due the men who have spent their money and time in its building. It means that Hillsboro is in the circuit; is entitled to and will get the best companies on the road, something it could not expect before. And it means more. For no longer will this city be infected with "barnstormers" or shows of the "bum" variety. Our people should see that the Crescent is well patronized.

One of the best speeches ever delivered in the court house in this city, by man or woman, was that of Miss Gail Laughlin, of New York, last Friday evening. Her topic was "Why Women Should Not Be Given the Right of Suffrage," and she proved conclusively that there was no good reason. She is a splendid talker, is deeply in earnest, and uses both facts and history to prove that women are entitled to equal rights with men. She said that the Indian and negro were given the right of franchise, while the women, far more capable and intelligent, were not permitted the same privilege—not that all women cared to vote, but it was not right to deprive them of a privilege granted to a foreigner who, as soon as they can secure papers, are allowed a voice in making laws for this country. She insisted that the women of the United States who were opposing the equal suffrage movement were standing in their own light and acting the part of the dog in the manger—couldn't eat the hay and wouldn't let the horse. She told of states where women were not allowed to control their own children and where they could not own property, and yet there was not a law enacted that did not

effect women as well as men. She said the day for ridicule had passed; that the movement was growing rapidly in all parts of the country, gaining friends steadily, and that its supporters could be found among the most influential men and women in the land, President Roosevelt being a staunch advocate of the cause. Miss Laughlin certainly gained friends in this city for the movement. From here she went to McMinnville, where a large meeting was held of that city delivering the address of welcome, in which he stated that he was thoroughly in sympathy with the movement and in favor of putting women where they belonged—on an equality with men.

Deaths. Martin Sandberg died at his home near this city last Friday night, the result of a paralytic stroke. He was born in Denmark and had been a resident of this county for the past twenty years. He was 66 years of age and had no relatives living in this county. The deceased left an estate valued at \$50,000.

The death of Mrs. Peris Chandler, widow of a pioneer missionary, occurred at the home of her daughter in Forest Grove Tuesday, at the age of 91 years. She accompanied her husband to Oregon in 1851. Mr. Chandler died in 1881. Miles Day Cady died at his home in Beaverton January 22, 1906. He was born in Cayuga county, New York, March 18, 1848, came to the Pacific coast in 1882, and to Beaverton in 1895. He leaves a father, three sisters, one brother and three sons. Mr. Cady was for several years deputy assessor under George H. Wilcox.

Grand Opera in Portland. The most important society and operatic event in the musical history of Portland will be the Grand Opera Festival of three days, beginning Monday, February 5, when Mr. Henry W. Savage's celebrated English Grand Opera Company and orchestra of fifty musicians will be heard for three performances.

Opera lovers in Portland and surrounding cities have been looking forward to this rare occasion ever since the first announcement that Manager Savage would send his splendid organization to the Northwest. The company is famous as the largest and most expensive aggregation of artists, musicians and productions that has ever attempted a complete cross-continent tour. The singing forces alone number over 150 people. To convey the enormous equipment of scenery, costumes, mechanical and electric effects, a special Grand Opera train of fourteen coaches and seven foot baggage cars is required. The performances will be arranged as follows: Monday evening, February 5, "Tannhauser." Tuesday evening, February 6, "Rigoletto." Wednesday evening, February 7, "Lohengrin." Wednesday matinee, February 7, "Faust." Season tickets for all performances will be placed on sale at the theater Monday, January 29, permitting patrons to select their seats for all four performances in advance of the regular sale that opens on Thursday, February 1.

The Portland Journal of last Monday says that Ben Oato, the diminutive Japanese who is accused of taking \$400 entrusted to him to pay off laborers employed near Hillsboro and then to have fled the country, was arrested this morning at Vancouver, British Columbia, by Chief of Police North. A telegram conveying this information was received by Chief of Police Gritzmacher. The arrest was made on the strength of a circular of information to which was annexed a photograph of the Japanese, sent out Saturday by Head Police Clerk Oato was signed by H. Kunitamoto, a Japanese contractor, whose office is at 208 Everett street. Oato made the trip to Hillsboro, but paid nobody, and on returning took the train for the north. Detectives Welch and Hartman worked on the case and the latter will go to Vancouver after the prisoner.
